in June. Delegates were present from all over the Dominion, and the reports submitted from the different provinces were most encouraging, showing as they did increasing energy and zeal in all the various activities of the Council. Special mention was made of the report on "Laws," by Mrs. Edwards and one of the most interesting submitted was that on "Mental Hygiene" by Miss Adam Shortt, of Ottawa. Mrs. Shortt emphasized strongly the need of special training of sub-normal or mentally defective children, who may if taken in time, be taught many useful crafts. The marriage and propagation of morons wsa a most serious menace to the life of a nation, and drastic means should be taken to prevent it if Canada is to possess in future a race sound in mind and

It was strongly felt that there should be greater co-operation between the women of the rural districts and those of the city, and the Women's Institutes throughout the country would further this if affiliated with the local councils. Albany, July 19-Mrs. Florence E. S. Knapp, Secretary of State of New York state, will represent Governor Alfred E. Smith and New York State at the American Day observance in Brockville, on Tuesday, July 20.
