THE EXECUTIVE OF COUNCIL OF WOMEN

Met at the Home of the President, Mrs. F. Etherington.

On Saturday afternoon the members of the executive of the Local Council of Women met at the home of the president, Mrs. F. Etherington, to receive the report of the Convention of the National Council held in Vancouver during the second week in June. Delegates were present from all over the Dominion, and the reports submitted from the different provinces were most encouraging, showing as they did increasing energy and zeal in all the various activities of the Council. Special mention was made of the report on "Laws," by Mrs. Edwards and one of the most interesting submitted was that on "Mental Hygiene" by Miss Adam Shortt of Ottawa. Mrs. Shortt emphasized strongly the need of special training of sub-normal or mentally defective children, who may if taken in time, be taught many useful crafts. The marriage and propagation of morons was a most serious menace to the life of a nation, and drastic means should be taken to prevent it if Canada is to possess in future a race sound in mind and body.

It was strongly felt that there should be greater co-operation between the women of the rural districts and those of the city, and the Women's Institutes throughout the country would further this if affiliated with the local councils. Mrs. Etherington's report was most comprehensive, clear and interesting, and was listened to with delight.

The meeting was held on the verandah overlooking the beautiful grounds and roses in full bloom, and the hour proved, not only profitable and instructive, but most enjoyable. Mrs. Jackson, who also attended the convention, reported briefly on "Immigration" and the censoring of moving pictures and publications, prohibiting especially those derogatory to British ideals.

Mrs. R. J. Diack spoke of the Provincial meeting at Toronto. An item which was received with the greatest pleasure was the fact that Miss E. L. Mowat, of this city, had been made an honorary member of the National Council.

At the close of the meeting tea was served by Mrs. Etherington at a table covered by a large bowl of pink roses.

WOMAN TO REPRESENT STATE OF NEW YORK

At American Day Observance in Brockville—Mrs. Florence E. S. Knapp.

Albany, July 19.—Mrs. Florence E. S. Knapp, Secretary of State of New York state, will represent Governor Alfred E. Smith and New York State at the American Day observance in Brockville, on Tuesday, July 20. Governor Smith found it impossible to accept the invitation extended by Mayor Reynolds and the Brockville officials, and designated Mrs. Knapp, who is a most acceptable speaker, to represent New York state. It will be Mrs. Knapp's first trip to Brockville, and likewise her first speech in Canada. Mrs. Knapp will motor from the State Capitol at Albany, to Morrisstown, and plans to reach Brockville before noon on Tuesday. In Brockville she will be greeted by Senator Hardy of the Dominion Government and a group of Brockville city officials. Mrs. Knapp enjoys the distinction of being the first woman ever elected in New York state, to the position she now holds. During her present incumbency of office, Mrs. Knapp supervised the taking of a census enumeration a year ago, during which over eleven million persons living in New York state were counted during a two weeks period.

Before assuming her present position at the State Capitol, Mrs. Knapp was head of the College of Home Economics at Syracuse University, one of the largest institutions of its kind in the United States. She has been identified with political activities in New York state for many years and is generally regarded as the political leader of her sex in the Empire State.
