CANADIAN OPEN AMATEUR GOLF

Many Valuable Prizes Have Been Offered—To Be Played Over Montreal Course.

Montreal, July 19.—With Ross Somerville safely escaped atop the Canadian amateur golf world, the attention of leading golfers, both amateur and professional, is turned to the Canadian Open Golf Cham-pionship which will be decided over the new course of the Royal Mon-treal Golf Club on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Aug. 5th, 6th and 7th.

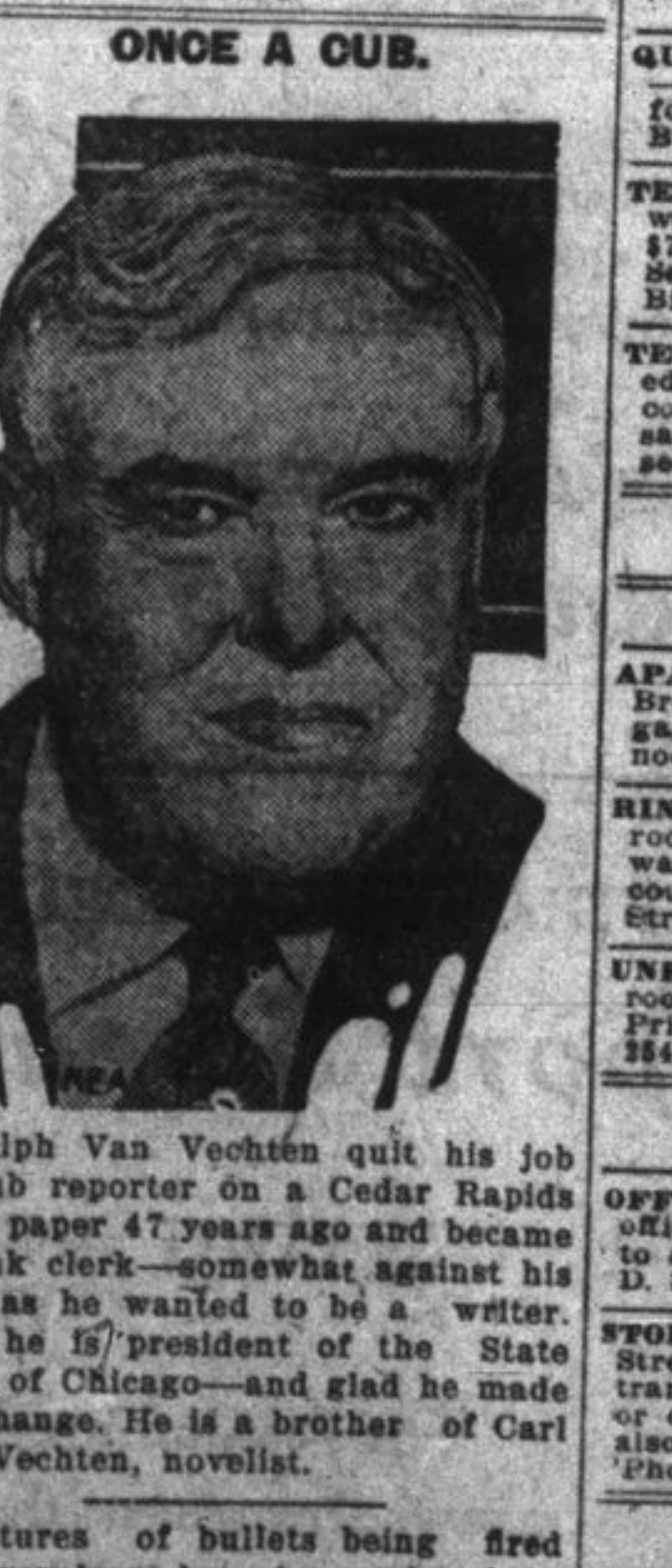
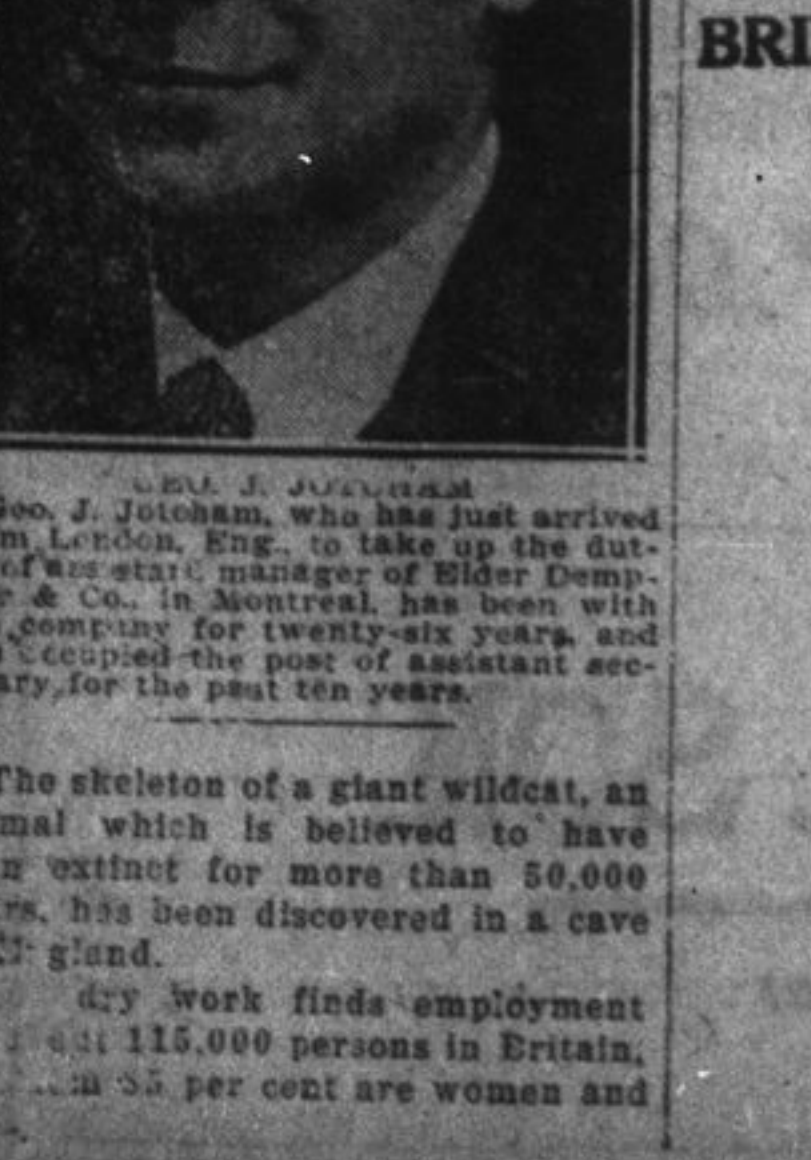
The title, and possession of the Rivermead Cup, will be determined by 72 holes of medal play, one round of 18 holes on each of the first two days, and two 18-hole rounds on Saturday for all those who are within 20 strokes of the leader at the end of the first 36 holes.

The usual large entry of United States players to battle the Canadian stars, is again expected. Leo Diegel, United States professional who has won the title for two years last year had to defeat Willie Macfarlane, United States open champion, and Walter Hagen. The event is open to all amateurs who have handicaps of 10 or less, and professionals. The title is yearly becoming a more de-sirable honor, and the prize money is considerably larger this year than in any of the previous championships.

Prizes this year will total \$1,320. Including a donation of \$520 from the Royal Montreal Club, and the list is as follows: Championship, gold medal and \$400 to the winner; the Rivermead Cup to be held by the club from which the winner is de-termined; second, \$250; third, \$200; fourth, \$150; fifth, \$100; sixth, \$75; seventh, \$50; eighth, \$40; ninth, \$30, and tenth, \$25.—If any of the first ten places are won by amateurs they will receive the equivalent of the prize money in plate and the leading amateur will receive a gold medal from the Royal Canadian Golf Association. In addition there are special prizes for professionals hold-ing positions with clubs belonging to the R.C.G.A., the Royal Montreal Club, the "Canadian Golfer" pres-enting prizes of \$35 and \$15 each for the first and second Canadian pros. in the event.

Entries for the championship close on Aug. 2nd with B. L. Anderson, Toronto, secretary of the R.C.G.A. The annual 36-hole championship of the Canadian Professional Gol-fers' Association will be held at the Summerlee Club, Montreal, on Aug. 6th. Percy Barrett, of the Lake Shore Club, Toronto, is the present champion.
