Sir Walter Gilby Gives Up Effort to Encourage Cereal Growing

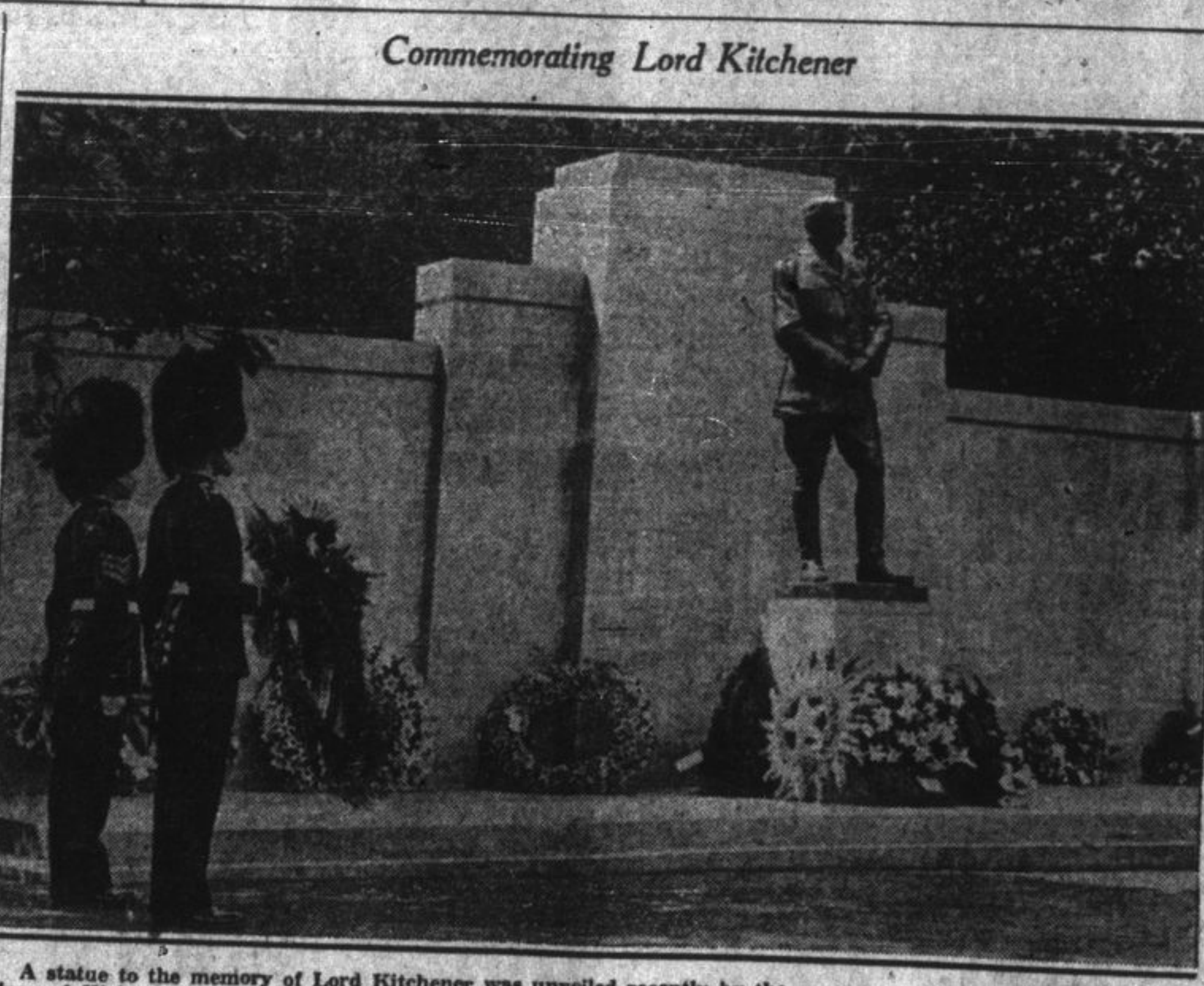
