OBITUARY

The Late Ethel Elizabeth Lemmon. The death occurred at her home, 246 Gerrard street east, of Mrs. Elizabeth Lemmon, wife of Frank Lemmon, at the age of forty-three. She was born in Kingston, a daughter of John and Elizabeth Comper. She is survived by her husband, one daughter, Thelma, her father, mother, three brothers and one sister, all of Toronto, and one sister of Detroit, Mich. She moved to Toronto from Kingston sixteen years ago.

On her paternal side, Mrs. Lemmon was a granddaughter of the late John Comper, a Crimean veteran, who came to Canada after the war and who afterwards joined the once famous Royal Canadian Rifles. This corps was composed of former British Army men who had seen much foreign service, and its companies were sent all through Canada West (now Ontario) and did duty in London, Hamilton, Niagara and other stations with its depot in Kingston, Ont. It was commanded by the late Colonel Moffatt, and was known as the "Canadian Bull Frogs," as it was clad in rifle-green uniforms.

On her maternal side, Mrs. Lemmon was a granddaughter of the late Alfred Maxam, a Fenian Raid veteran, who did duty in 1866 along the St. Lawrence River with the 14th Princess of Wales' Own Rifles, Kingston. She was interred in Mount Pleasant cemetery, Toronto.

Harry Watts. The funeral of the late Harry Watts, who was killed at the Ernestown crossing of the C.N.R. Monday noon, took place on Wednesday afternoon, from his late residence, at Sharpton, and was one of the largest funerals ever witnessed in this section.
