CANDIDATES IN FIELD. Forty-eight Nominated So Far For Ontario Seats. Toronto, July 24.—Forty-eight candidates have been placed in the field for Ontario's 82 seats in the House of Commons by to-night, including twenty-five Conservatives, nineteen Liberals, two Progressives, one Liberal-Progressive, and one Liberal-Labor-Progressive.

W. J. Taylor, publisher of the Woodstock Sentinel-Review, was chosen by a joint convention of Liberals and Progressives of Oxford North, and Malcolm Lang was the nominee for Temiskaming South, at a convention in which Liberals, Labor and Progressives were represented.

NEWS OF THE FARM

Good Haying Weather—Veal Dairy Calves—Better Farm Buildings in Ontario Than U. S.—Crossing Pure Breeds of Poultry.

The official forecast of 327,000,000 bushels for the 1926 wheat crop of Canada is unduly conservative, declares W. L. Smith, former editor of The Farmers' Sun, who is now living in Alberta.

U.S. tourists in this country often remark upon the solidity and permanence of Ontario farm buildings as compared with their own; and here is a report in a Montana paper on buildings in Saskatchewan: "Except for larger and better constructed farm buildings it is difficult to tell when we have crossed the international boundary line."

Crossing Pure Breeds. Crossing pure breeds of poultry, although fairly extensively practised in Britain, is almost unknown in Canada.

Good Haying Weather. Haying, now almost completed throughout Western and Central Ontario, and well advanced in the east, has been done this year under unusually favorable conditions.

Wheat harvest has commenced in the southwest. Spring grains are generally promising, except in the east. Corn is two to three weeks behind time, and unless there is continued hot weather with showers much will not mature.

A New Fraud. Ontario farmers, after experience with fakes exceeding in number the famous 57 varieties, might be pardoned for thinking that they had seen them all; but a new brand has just come to light in Oxford.

The body was cut to pieces before the attention of the fellow-workers had been obtained and the machinery stopped, the accident taking but a fraction of a minute.
