ROAD IN BAD SHAPE; TOURISTS COMPLAINING

It is stated that there is a detour this side of Gananoque, but that this, too, is in terrible condition. The contractor on the job, west of Gananoque, has been making some improvements, but it is stated that the roadway will stand considerable attention yet.
