CROP CONDITIONS IN OLD ONTARIO

The following extracts are from weekly reports of Agricultural Representatives to the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

Carleton—Haying has been the order of the day for the past week or ten days. Most of the alfalfa is cut and reports indicate an average crop. The general hay crop is uneven there being a number of real good fields and on the other hand a number of poor fields. Corn which for two weeks past still has this week some right along. Oats on the whole are a poor crop in the country. They do not seem to be making the growth that the other spring sown grains are. On our hay lands the oat crop is short, a poor one and very uneven.

Dufferin—Owing to the apparent disappointment with this early crop, there appears to have been a larger storage of turning and rape sown than usual. The weather of the past ten days has been ideal for the potato, crop as it appears to be making remarkable growth at present.

Durham—Alsike promised to give a good yield of seed. Many excellent fields have been noted during the past two weeks. The acreage may not be so high as usual. Yields may be above the average. Fall wheat that looked rather poor in the spring has developed remarkably well and will give a fair yield. There is, generally speaking, a good crop of hay. Many silos have been filled with sweet clover.

Essex—Most of wheat is out. Oats are ripening fast and a few fields are cut. Peas still coming in to the canneries but crop about over. Tobacco crop shows indications of being above the average. Corn borers are making their appearance.

Frontenac—A few raspberries have made their appearance, and growers are asking 30c for reds and 25c for purples. Huckleberries are selling for 20 to 25c a quart.

Haldimand—The hay harvest is completed. The season was never more favorable for making first-class alfalfa than from the first cutting, and as a result most farmers have large quantities of quality hay stored in their barns. Alsike and blue grass harvest is on and will be completed the end of next week.

Halton—Farmers have commenced the cutting of fall wheat. It is certainly an excellent crop in the country. Many good fields have been plowed in preparation for fallow and wheat.

Hastings—What at first appeared to be a very poor year with respect to farm crops in this county has proven itself to be a banner year. With the exception of corn all crops are fully up to the average. Oats above the average with prospects of a bumper potato and root crop. A few farmers have commenced this year to use sweet clover as an ensilage in place of corn.

Kent—The majority of wheat is harvested and threshing in the field has commenced. The average yield will be lower than that of last year although there is an occasional field which will run well up the fifty bushel mark. Sugar beets, tobacco and beans are all in a healthy condition yet need moisture to make any rapid growth.

Lambton—The green pea harvest for the canning factories has been exceptionally good. The yield of peas has been above the average. Some fall wheat and barley have been cut in the south of the county.

Lincoln—Demand continues fairly good for potatoes at \$2.25 to \$2.50 per bushel. Sweet cherries are holding strong at \$1.00 and 75c ours
