J. Doucet, ex-M.P., speaking on the same platform as Premier Meighen.

"An infamous story has been circulated, to which repulsing details have been added, to the effect that I have been one of the passengers on a Customs boat, the Margaret, on a trip during which all laws of decency and morals have been violated. Despicable individuals have repeated this vile calumny with the same pleasure dil-breeding insects take in spreading a plague.

"Finally, an ex-member of Pardiament, A. J. Doucet, has made a public statement in the presence of Mr. Meighen while he was accompanying his chief through the Maritime Provinces, that I had participated in that excursion which he claims was made, and that I had boarded the 'Margaret' at Quebec.

More Than 150 Persons Are Missing In the Bahamas Since the Hurricane

Nassau, Bahamas, July 30 .--Ravaged by wind and wave, with more than 150 persons missing, the Bahama Islands remained virtually isolated from communication with the outside world to-day while anxious residents took further count of the toll of destruction from the worst hurricane in the recorded history of the islands. The majority of those miss-

drowned with the sponge fishing fleet which has not been seen since it set sail three days before the West Indian hurricane struck the islands Monday night. Several weeks must elapse before the official toll of death and shipping and property damage is known. While conservative estimates place damage at \$8,000,000, reports have not been received from several islands of the group.

AUTO INDUSTRY MUCH AHEAD OF 1925 TRADE

Production For Six Months of the Present Year Shows Great Gains.

Ottawa, July 30 .- Production of automobiles in Canada last month was slightly below the record output for May, but considerably above June, 1925. Of the 21,751 units turned out of Canadian factories in June, 6,610 were open cars, 11,175 closed models, 2,586 trucks, 1,354 chassis and 26 taxicabs or buses. Almost twice as many closed models were made in June this year compared with June, 1925. The production of open models showed a mark-

The value of the cars made, in the first half of 1926, based on selling price f.o.b. plant, was about \$16,-000,000, or 27 per cent. higher than the same period last year.
