George and John Irvine, Belleville, has been honored at the nineteenth biennial convention of the Ontario Association for the Deaf at Windsor by appointment to the presidency, the first woman ever to hold the highest offices in the gift of the association.

The water in Smith's Falls is as good as it is in any other town in Ontario, and it should be, after all the expense that the Waterworks Commission has recently gone to in establishing the present filtration plant, which is supposed to be the last word in such a system and upon every Government test of the water, made in Ottawa fortnightly, the report comes back "good."

Passing of Mrs. Isaac Bogart. The death occurred Wednesday at Pembroke of Isabel Nancy Merkle, widow of Isaac Bogart, a well-known and esteemed resident, and one who had been closely associated with the life of the town for the past forty-nine years. Ill for nearly two years, her death came suddenly at her residence, 253 Cecilia street, at the age of seventy-nine years. Born in 1847, at Chesterville, she was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Merkle.

The Late Mrs. Usher. Death claimed a well known woman in the person of Mary Belle Campbell, wife of William Usher, Smith's Falls, who passed away Wednesday after a long illness. Mrs. Usher was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Campbell, Perth, and spent most of her childhood days in Renfrew. She was married to Mr. Usher about seventeen years ago and lived for some time in Renfrew and Sand Point. About eleven years ago she moved to Smith's Falls and during that time had made numerous friends by her kindly ways and happy disposition. She underwent an operation eight weeks ago.

A Distinguished Career. The Collingwood Bulletin, says the late W. H. Smith, drowned at Kingston was born in Chicago thirty-four years ago, when the family resided there, but settled in Owen Sound when very small. He attended the bible schools and the Owen Sound Collegiate Institute, and after graduating from the latter went to McGill University at Montreal, which he attended for five years, graduating with the degree of Bachelor of Science. When the war broke out in 1914 he answered his country's call and went overseas with the Railroad Corps and served with distinction. He had the rank of Captain, and was awarded the Military Cross for distinguished service in action.

A Motorboat Burned. At the regatta at Rideau Ferry on Wednesday an unfortunate incident occurred near the end of the programme, when the Edna II., belonging to Gordon Edwards, Ottawa, caught fire near the centre of the motorboat. There were four or five people in the boat at the time, and one of them, a woman, jumped into the water when the explosion occurred, and was rescued by people who were on the bridge. It is fortunate that the accident happened very close to the shore, as a number of boats were on the scene to take off the other occupants of the ill-fated boat. Practically all that was saved was the Union Jack on the stern of the boat.

To Visit the Islands. Mrs. Clover Boldt Miles, who recently secured her divorce decree from A. Graham Miles, in Reno, Nev., is expected at the Thousand Islands August 1. Mrs. Miles has leased the houseboat La Duchess. She will not occupy her house, the Thousand Island villa she retained for her own use when the Boldt estates were sold to Edward J. Noble, some time ago, as that cottage is leased for a term of years to Mrs. Frederick Courtland Penfield, who has occupied the cottage since early July.
