ECONOMIC BOYCOTT STARTED AS PROTEST

To the Orders Issued Over Religious Regulations in Mexico.

Mexico City, Aug. 6.—It is not the intention of the Roman Catholic episcopate of Mexico, to be "treasonable to its duties" in any plan that might be evolved for the settlement of the controversy between the church and the government, growing out of enforcement of religious regulations. Taking cognizance of the message of President Calles, to president Leguia of Peru, in which president reaffirmed his intention to carry out laws, episcopate says the Mexican clergy has never opposed the progress of Mexico, that the clergy is not rebellious and that opposition to regulations is justified because they encroach upon the liberty of the conscience. Episcopate adds it is still ready to "Reach just settlement." Meanwhile deadlock between the government and the church continues. The situation today was that the government would continue enforcement of the law, while the church will maintain attitude of non-acceptance of regulations. While there have been some disturbances, for most part, people are going about customary duties calmly awaiting developments.

Economic boycott called to protest against regulations is declared by Roman Catholic leaders, to be more effective throughout the country, than is indicated at the capital. Government officials believe the assertion of seriousness are perhaps exaggerated, while business men and official observers regard situation as serious. Notable is the enthusiasm with which women are carrying out the boycott. All things that might be called luxuries are being cut out by them. The decrease in the sales of feminine apparel is estimated as high as forty per cent. So far, no comment has been made on the American Knights of Columbus strong protest against regulations.

SCREW TAKEN FROM LUNG.

A Remarkable Operation Saved the Life of Doomed Boy.  
Boston, Aug. 6.—Edward Bibeau, a six-year-old Plymouth boy, was on the road to health today after undergoing a rare and delicate operation in which a two-inch screw was removed from his right lung.  
Dr. William J. Sheehan, assisted by two other surgeons, operated yesterday after a powerful X-ray had been used to locate the impediment. Through tubes, they removed the screw, and young Bibeau, whose life had been considered in grave danger, immediately resumed regular breathing.

WIFE'S EYE BURNED OUT.

Man Is Also Charged With Causing Nurse's Death.  
New York, Aug. 6.—Samuel Wallach, aged twenty-nine, president of a window-cleaning company, was arrested on the charge of burning out one of the eyes of his nineteen-year-old wife, and causing the death of Mrs. Sophie Blust, aged sixty-nine, a guardian of the Wallach's three-year-old child, by smearing the woman with a corrosive poison. When identified by his wife as the assailant of herself and Mrs. Blust, Wallach said, according to the police: "When my body is strapped in the electric chair, I'll still love you." Wallach denied the charge.  
Mrs. Wallach said her husband attacked her when she refused to return to him after an estrangement of several months. Mrs. Blust, the wife said, struggled with Wallach to protect Mrs. Wallach, and he tore her clothing away and smeared her with the poison.
