An elm tree in the grounds at "Elmhurst," King street, that had stood the battle and the breeze for more than a century was badly shaken during Saturday mornings storm and had one big section torn from the main trunk. The scarred tree is still bravely carrying on.

Former Pastor Preached.
Rev. John Waddell, pastor of the United Church, at Winchester, occupied the pulpit of Princess street United Church at both services on Sunday. Rev. Mr. Waddell is a former pastor of the church, and there were large congregations at both services to welcome him back to Kingston.

Storm Hits Flowers.
The heavy storm which broke on Saturday morning, did a great deal of damage among the flower gardens around the city, especially among the hollyhocks and other tall plants. Before the storm, the hollyhocks in the garden of Governor Hawkey of the County Jail were among the very finest in the city.

Streets Look Badly.
The streets are in a dishevelled state owing to the wreckage from the trees as a result of Saturday morning's storm. The trees were shorn of their dead branches and these litter the streets as well as leaves, and debris thrown from the lawns. The Board of Works should put out a gang of men at cleaning up.

A SPECIAL ORDER FOR FARM LABORERS

Local Labor Conditions Brightened Up Over the Week-end.

A special farm order has been received at the local office of the Employment Service, asking for farm laborers to go to the west. The wages mentioned are \$3.50 per day. The order reads as follows: "Experienced farm laborers may be sent to Winnipeg without reference. Wages at present, \$3.50 per day. Should have a few dollars on arrival at destination. Experienced married couples, without children, may also be transferred. Wages \$85 per month, with \$1 per day additional during harvest and threshing."

Local labor conditions have brightened up to some extent over the week-end, and requests were in on Monday morning for men for the local quarry, for miners for a mine near Kingston and for rough carpenters.
