STREET SIGNS NEEDED AT INTERSECTIONS

Would Be a Great Benefit to Both the Visitors and Citizens.

A matter which might very well be given the attention of the Board of Trade, the Tourists' Association, and the City Council, is the placing of signs at the intersections of the city streets...

There are at the present time, some street signs up but they are fastened to the sides of buildings and are not easy to locate, especially by persons passing by in motor cars.

And visitors are not the only persons who have to rely on street signs to find a given address. There are very few people in Kingston who know every section of the city so well as not to need street signs.

The most modern method of marking streets is to erect signs at each intersection on a pole at the outside edge of the sidewalk. On the principal streets, the standards for the electric street lamps are usually utilized for this purpose.

It would doubtless cost a comparatively large sum of money to erect street signs at every intersection in the city, if the work was all done at once, but if the council laid out a definite plan and started with the principal streets and each year erected a certain number of signs until the city was completed, the cost would not be an excessive burden, and the signs would be a very great convenience.

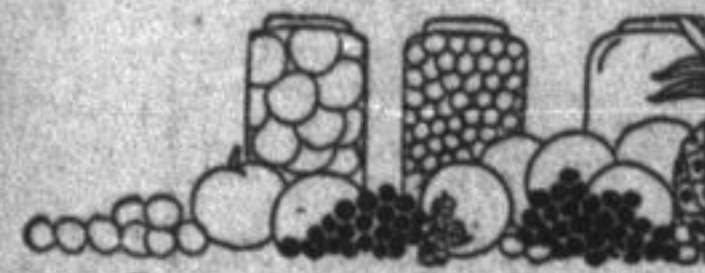
