TERMS REACHED FOR ENCROACHMENTS MADE

Ground Between Collegiate Institute and Victoria School Leased for Recreation.
 Early in May last Mr. J. M. Campbell and Mr. J. G. Elliott visited Ottawa in connection with the demands made upon the Kingston Board of Education for the sum of over \$20,000 for the purchase of the vacant ground between the Collegiate Institute and Victoria School and used for recreation purposes. A valuator had been in Kingston, and had appraised the property, and the Board was asked to either purchase or pay rental to the amount of \$800 per year.
 The matter was placed before the Department of Interior by the deputations, and after fully discussing the issue, it was felt by departmental officials that the Kingston Board of Education should pay for the encroachments made under a previous lease, and the balance of the grounds should be leased at a nominal rental for recreation purposes.
 This was agreed to and the Kingstonsians were asked to name a sum which they thought fair for the land encroached upon. The sum was fixed at \$1,000, and the department agreed that the rental of the land for recreation purposes should be \$1 per year, and the lease issued for five years. This lease, of course, can be extended from time to time.
 On Thursday the secretary of the Board of Education, Mr. W. J. C. Allen, received word that the necessary order-in-council has been passed and, on receipt of the payment of \$1,000 and the necessary expenses for the compilation of the proper papers, the details would be completed. Satisfaction is expressed among members of the Board of Education at the successful culmination of the matter.

WRITES ABOUT A VISIT HE PAID TO KINGSTON

Mr. A. F. Messervey Has a Breezy Article in The Halifax Mail.
 Mr. A. F. Messervey writes an article in the Halifax Evening Mail on Kingston which he visited while attending the annual meeting of the Odd Fellows' Relief Association. Among other things he said:
 "The convention I attended brought together business men from all parts of Canada, and were I actively engaged in the game of politics I know of no better opportunity one could have to get the viewpoint of other portions of our Dominion, were one so inclined to canvass the situation. One familiar person was missed from our meeting, which was much regretted by those present: I refer to Hon. J. A. Robb, ex-minister of finance.
 "Through the courtesy of General A. E. Ross we were taken by him in his car and shown several points of interest, not the least of which was the first Government House in Upper Canada, a very small and unpretentious wooden building, that did it come within the purview of our city assessors, would not be rated for more than \$300 over the value of the land upon which it rested. I also visited many places I had not seen on previous visits, among them was portions of the Royal Military College grounds. The General pointed out to us the campus in front of the Administration Building, and over which it was a tradition that no freshman can walk, if he has to cross, he it twenty times a day, it must be on the run. Many of its former students now in Halifax, and which among others includes our city engineer, will remember even if not with pleasure how they had to perform this little stunt in the stormy winter days. We were also told by our distinguished guide that on said campus the students put on some of their athletic feats.
 "One of the things the juniors were encouraged to take up for the benefit of physical development was shot-putting. Quite often in an endeavor to spur the young ones on, the commandant will say: 'Look here, put a little more weight behind that shot. I would send for Angus and let him show you how to do it, only that I am afraid he would put it across the campus and into the corridor of headquarters and perhaps do a lot of damage.' Now to relieve your curiosity as to Angus, and who, when one looked him over, you could well believe him capable of doing all the commandant claimed for him. His full name is Angus Macdonald, I understand he is a native of Cape Breton, who was apparently brought up on the good old oatmeal, and for aught I know, the Shorter Catechism. When he returned from overseas for a couple of years he was a member of the Halifax police force; Gittingen street for a time was a portion of his beat, and he certainly kept law and order in that district. He removed to Kingston in 1923 and is one of the caretakers at the College, and tells me he is quite contented there.

RUNAWAY BOYS ARE CHARGED WITH THEFT
 Three Lads Rounded Up by the Police at Deseronto and Remanded.

Belleville, Aug. 12.—Arrest of three boys, 14 years of age, who were fugitives from the St. John's Industrial School, Toronto, at Deseronto, is said to explain a series of entries which have occurred in Trenton, Belleville, Deseronto and one or two other places. The lads were remanded to be escorted back to the school.
 They are alleged to have broken into places in several towns west of Trenton, including one boot store, two dry goods houses, the Belle Telephone office, the Dominion Stores and St. Peter's Church at Trenton, three houses in Belleville and the G.W.V. A.
 One of the boys is said to have left an old shirt with a prison mark on it in one of the stores at Trenton. The shirt with the number was found by Chief Bain, who communicated with Toronto, and found it was the number of a lad wanted there for escaping from the school. Five hours later he received word of their capture in Deseronto.
 In Trenton they are said to have stolen about \$200 worth of goods and money and a pearl ring. Most of their booty had been spent or lost on their travels east. Trenton police had a task to find their discarded clothing to send back to the institution.
 Visiting Her Husband.
 Mrs. G. Lalonde has been in Belleville visiting her husband, George Lalonde, captain of the barve Neudine, injured several days ago, but who is now making rapid progress toward recovery. Capt. Lalonde was in charge of unloading a cargo of coal at Belleville when he was struck by the coal hoist. The hoist hit him on the head, inflicting a terrible cut and throwing him into the water.
