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**Ontario Election In October Is Another Guess**

George Strobel, of Toronto, Held Without Bail for Attempted Murder.

Toronto, Aug. 12.—Facing two charges of attempted murder, in connection with an attack made upon his wife, Mrs. George Strobel, and his step-daughter, Miss Nora Jones, George Strobel appeared in police court today, and was remanded for one week, without bail.

Crown Attorney Murphy stated that his prisoner was facing two charges of attempted murder, which might result in a life term in prison. Miss Jones is still unconscious, and grave doubts are expressed concerning her condition.

**GIVING OF INTERVIEW HAS CAUSED A ROW**

This is the Latest Development in the Trouble in Mexico.

Mexico City, Aug. 12.—The Minister of the Interior, Tejada, has issued a statement declaring that an interview, said to have been given to a New York newspaper, by Archbishop Mora Del Rio, of Mexico, violates a clause of the Mexican constitution, prohibiting clergymen from criticizing fundamental laws of Mexico, or Mexican government. Therefore, says the statement, the interview "has been cited to Attorney-General for investigation."

This is said to mean that if the Attorney-General finds the charges of Tejada justified, the government may order the arrest and trial of Archbishop.

Minister of Interior announces that it has no knowledge of executions growing out of religious situations which have been reported here by Archbishop Leopoldo Ruiz Flores, of the state of Michoacan. Information which the Archbishop brought to this city was to the effect that two Catholic priests and between twenty-seven and thirty-seven citizens were executed after an all-day battle between the troops and Catholics in the town of Zahuayo. Bishop estimated that fifty persons had been killed in the battle. Economic boycott continues to depress business, and there seemingly are no prospects for reconciliation of completely opposed positions of Catholic episcopate and the government.

**Given Up Hope For The Fishing Liner**

Halifax, Aug. 12.—Radio messages flashing in from waste of waters around Sable Island this morning, failed to bring hopes for tidings that twenty-five Nova Scotia fishermen, members of Lunenburg liner Sylvis Mosher had been found. But on contrary, all information available from those in position to know something of what happened in that storm-ridden section of Atlantic last Saturday and Sunday, strengthens the belief that piling up of schooner on north bar last Tuesday night, was culmination of one of the worst tragedies in recent history of Nova Scotia fishing fleet.

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**PREMIER MEIGHEN READS A TELEGRAM**

He Received in Reply to Question He Put to Sir Henry Thornton.

Brandon, Aug. 12.—Premier Meighen last night produced telegrams exchanged between himself and Sir Henry Thornton, President of Canadian National Railways, in regard to allegations of political interference with Canadian National management. It opens with the following telegram from Mr. Meighen to Sir Henry, dated Aug. 6:

"Statements are being made that the present government, including myself, have been and are interfering with the management of the National Railways. I ask you to wire me whether there is slightest foundation for these assertions, and if so, to advise me what it is." In reply Sir Henry said:

"I have to say that the administration of the Canadian National Railways has no complaint whatever with respect to the attitude of the present government, or, indeed, preceding government, in their relation to the National Railways system."

Mr. Meighen, following the reading of his correspondence with Sir Henry Thornton of the Hudson Bay railway.

"I am not going to enter into any competition of promises with the Mackenzie King government," Mr. Meighen said. "They can beat me at that all around the bush. They have all the awards, belts and records, in the world on a score of promises."

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
