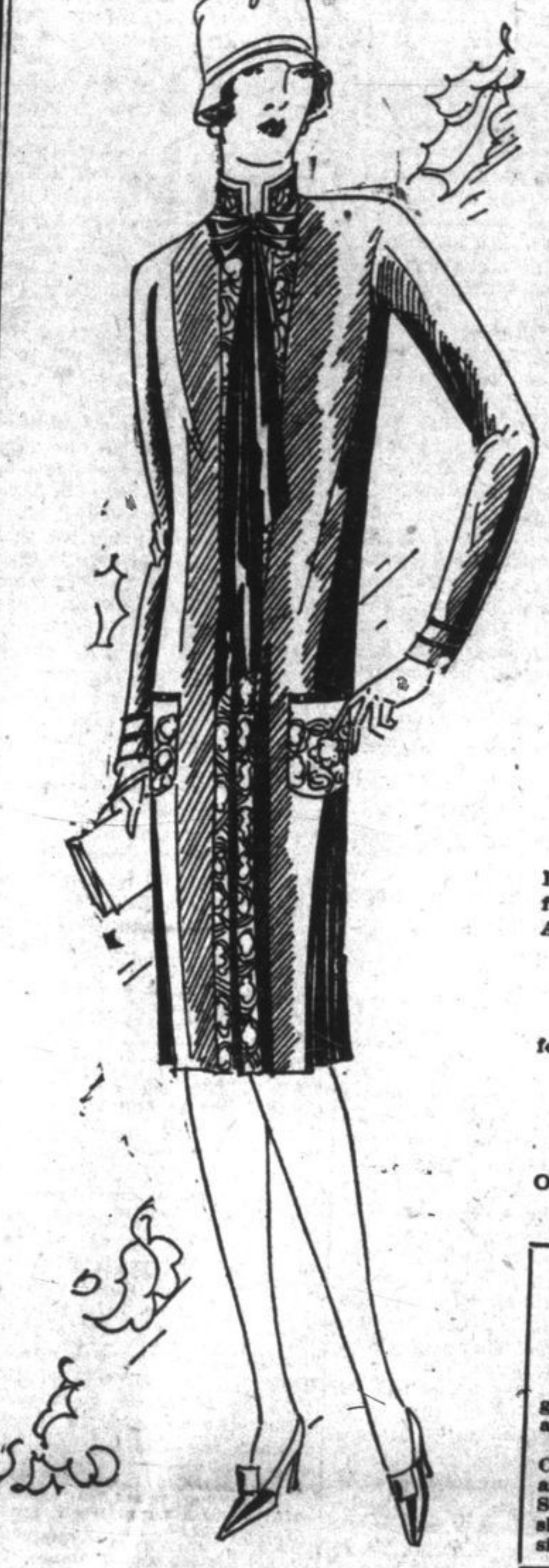
BADLY SPRAINED KNEE.
