MATTERS OF INTEREST TO SUMMER SCHOOL

Were Taken Up at Final Meeting of Association for Present Term.

Whether or not a university newspaper is of any practical use to the student body, was discussed at the last meeting of the Queen's Summer School Association for the present term which was held in Convocation Hall on Monday night.

Several other matters of the first importance to the extra-mural students also came up, among them being the dates for the summer school term next year, the provision of more tennis accommodation and suggestions as to courses to be given next, term. Mr. J. L. Challinor, the retiring president, occupied the chair.

It was decided that the association would recommend to the university authorities that the opening and closing dates for Queen's Summer School next year be July 7th and August 17th.

The discussion as to the merits of a university paper was not merely an academic problem, but it was a concrete proposition, for the Summer School has this year carried on the Queen's Journal, the official university newspaper, and at least some of the students are convinced that it is no valuable addition to the association activities. Opinions were voiced for and against the newspaper, and the matter finally was disposed of when a motion that the subscription to the Journal be reduced to fifty cents per term, and that this subscription fee be compulsory and collectable with the regular tuition fees, was moved, seconded, voted on and lost. It is now certain that the subscription fee to the Journal will not be compulsory but, as to whether or not the paper operates at all next summer, rests with the newly installed executive.

The Summer School Association fee for next year will be fifty cents, collectable with tuition and athletic fees. A request was made that the Carpenter : Phone 987 university authorities make an effort to supply information to students at east one year in advance as to what courses would be offered at the Summer School. Requests for classes for next term included advance work in Spanish, history, economics, biology physics, mathematics, Latin and

> Mr. A. H. Carr, director of extension courses at Queen's, was present at the meeting, and addressed the students briefly. In his remarks he stated that the student who took the course extramurally, deserved every bit of credit when he successfully passed his examinations. The intramural student got much help from lectures, but the student outside the university had to dig for his information, he said. In concluding Mr. Carr said that he was sure that the university would be pleased to accommodate any teachers of any district who wished to hold their annual convention at Queen's

A petition to have four cement tennis courts built at the university was unanimously carried by the meeting. The petition declared that the present number of cement courts was inadequate, and that the grass courts were not in

proper shape to be played on The financial statement of the association showed that \$1,685.55 had been received and that \$1,457.79 had been expended, leaving a balance of \$228.76. The auditors' report was adopted. The meeting closed with the installation of the new executive, and a vote of thanks to the retiring executive, the orchestra and the staff of the Journal.



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
