DR. HUYCK SPEAKS ON ROTARY EDUCATION

The Public Should Be Better Acquainted With Aims and Objects.

Rotarian Dr. P. H. Huyck addressing the Kingston Rotary Club on Thursday, dealt with Rotary education, and outlined some of the methods which had been suggested at the Denver convention, to promote the knowledge of Rotary aims and ideals, both among club members and the general public.

The speaker told of the inception of the Rotary idea and its growth, and he then read an extract to the effect that Rotary was beginning to weaken; that one of the clubs had already surrendered its charter, and that others were reported to be not functioning satisfactorily. A writer in The Rotarian, the official organ of Rotary International, had suggested that the cause of the trouble was lack of Rotary education, said Rotarian Huyck. He believed this was so, and he wished to briefly report the proceedings of the meeting on Rotary education which had been a part of the Denver convention.

Two suggestions had been made there; one was that each Rotary Club have a club council, composed of the officers and chairmen of committees, and that immediately following the annual convention, that this council meet and consider the international programme set forth, and discuss ways and means for effectively carrying it out. The other suggestion was the formation of a Rotary school for club members. This would meet four times a year, and consider different phases of Rotary education.

That the general public should be made better acquainted with the aims and objects of Rotary through a thoughtful presentation of these things, rather than by shouting the virtues of Rotary from the house tops, was another point made by the speaker. The lives lived by Rotarians would be the standard by which the movement would be largely judged, he said.

Rotarian Frank Coates presided and President Claude Gordon moved a vote of thanks to the speaker which was seconded by Rotarian Roy Ward and heartily endorsed by the club. One of the guests at the luncheon was Rotarian E. LeRoy Rice, of Newport, Ver., formerly the pastor of the First Congregational church here. Other guests included a number of American Rotarians who happened to be in the city.

MEIGHEN SAYS TO BOOST THE TARIFF

Speaking in Parliament on June 2nd, 1925, Mr. Meighen said: "What might have been a sufficient tariff five years ago is, even though not interfered with, an insufficient tariff today."

Mr. Meighen is still saying that. He is telling the west that he favors "adequate" protection and a "stable" tariff.

These two words will bear whatever meaning a Conservative likes to give them in the locality where he is seeking votes. They are weasel words and can dodge in and out with alacrity, meaning this now and something else again. In one locality it can be urged that the present tariff is adequate; somewhere else it can be urged that the tariff will need to be doubled to make it adequate.

It is the same with a "stable" tariff. What is meant by the use of the word? It is meant to mean whatever the elector wants it to mean. To one man it may seem to mean that the tariff is to stand unchanged. To another it means a tariff hoisted higher and left there, where nobody can get at and lower it.

All along, however, Mr. Meighen sticks to it that the present tariff must be hoisted. He blurs his words on this subject when speaking in the west and the maritime provinces, but in politics he represents those who want the tariff hoisted.

He can't be elected with that as his declared purpose. The grain-growing provinces and the discontented maritimes will not stand for further tariff hoists.

Was Old Resident. Mrs. Alex. Steele, Carleton Place, one of the town's oldest and most highly esteemed citizens, died Wednesday morning. Mrs. Steele was in her ninetieth year, her maiden name was Agnes Whyte, and she was born in Beckwith township. On Nov. 13th, 1858, she was married to Alexander Steele of Ramsay township, her husband predeceased her about fifteen years ago. She had resided with her son, Dr. M. H. Steele, of Carleton Place for the last ten years. Prior to that she had resided in Almonte for about thirty years. There are left five sons and three daughters.

On Tuesday the death occurred at the Children's Memorial Hospital Montreal, of Frederick M. Hayes, only son of Martin Hayes and his wife, Beatrice Lafontaine. He was three years of age. His mother is a former resident of Brockville and Maitland.
