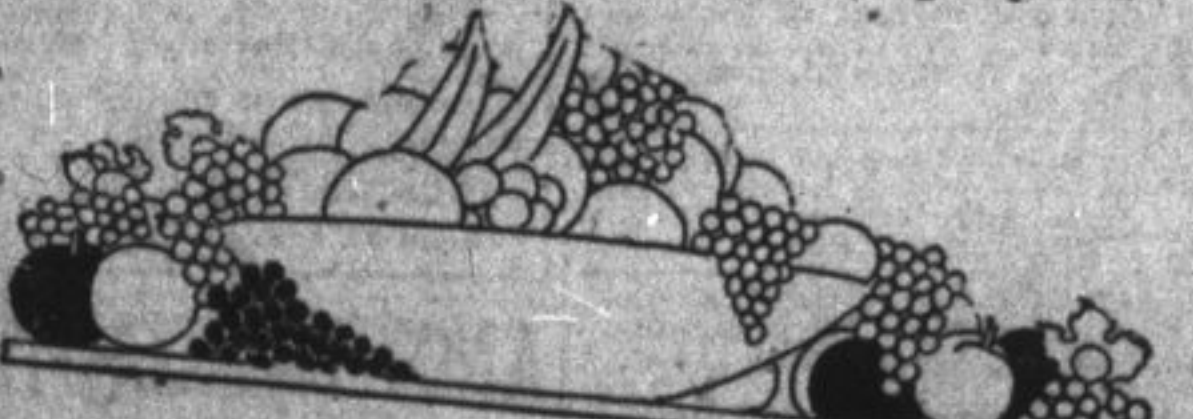

Architect Signally Honored. Mr. John A. Pearson, who designed the restoration of the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa, has been elected a Fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects. He is president of the Ontario Association of Architects. He is a brother of Mrs. David B. Murray, Frontenac street.

Died in Ottawa. Following a brief illness, there occurred on Aug. 17th, the death of Arthur Crawley Bleakney, late chief clerk of the supplies and purchasing branch of the department of customs and excise, Ottawa. He was father of Mrs. Stuart Bleakney, of Rio Janeiro, Brazil, and a graduate of Queen's.

Dies in Minneapolis. Mrs. J. V. Brady, 611 Thirty-first street, Saskatoon, died in Aug. 9th, in St. Mary's Hospital, Minneapolis, of tumor on the brain. Mrs. Brady has been in failing health for the past five years. She was forty years of age, and leaves a husband, J. V. Saskatoon, and a sister, Miss Clara Falconer, Winnipeg. Mr. Brady is well known in the city.

Makes Record Catch. Mrs. A. Mann, New York City, who spends her summers at the Thousand Islands, made a record catch while fishing in the St. Lawrence. She brought in the limit of muskellunge, four in number, weighing from twelve to twenty pounds, also five pickerel. This is a record for one day, as at no previous time has any one reported this number.

Played in Victoria Park. At Victoria Park Thursday evening, the Salvation Army band rendered a wonderful programme of music. The Pastora, Songs of Scotland, was especially appreciated by the large crowd present. Band concerts will soon be over for the summer and the people are taking advantage of them while they have the chance.

Caught a Big Bass. Francis Manderville, Watertown, N.Y., caught a bass near Cape Vincent, N.Y., which weighed four and one-half pounds and measured 13 1/2 inches in length. Alone in the boat, Mr. Manderville was forced to exert all of his energy to the difficult task

of landing the small mouthed bass. At one stage of the battle it was a toss-up whether he would catch the fish or if the fish would catch him.

The Neighbors Are Helpful. The recent fire at Wilmur, was at the home of Herbert Guthrie, not Duffy as reported, Telephonic transmission gave the wrong sound of name. The origin of the fire is thought to have been by mice nibbling matches. The neighbors and friends are giving liberal donations to the family including clothes, household effects, etc. The family fled from the burning house in their night robes.

Canadian Roads Best. Walter Wessels, Belleville, has returned from a 4,200 miles motor trip. Of interest to every Canadian motorist is Mr. Wessels' statement that Ontario highways are far and away superior to those encountered across the line. On the trip north from Denver, the party travelled a distance of approximately 1,000 miles before striking any concrete roads, in contrast to the beautiful highways over which they travelled in our own Province.

Established by a Kingstonian. The Hamilton Spectator is eighty years of age. It was established on July 15th, 1846, by Mr. Robert R. Smiley, a Kingston printer, and a friend of Sir John A. Macdonald. The enterprise was a successful one, and Smiley's venture prospered, but he was not long spared to reap the fruits of his industry, he died in 1855. He established the journal to preach the doctrine of moderation to allay the bitterness which followed the rebellion of 1837.

Team Had Tire Trouble. Motor trips do have their troubles even for baseball players. The Victoria baseball team which played in Ottawa Thursday had some tire trouble in Prescott, and was held up Friday morning. Tires for the large bus which they were using could not be had there, so it was necessary to have them sent down from Kingston which caused quite a delay. However the team arrived quite safely about three o'clock this afternoon.

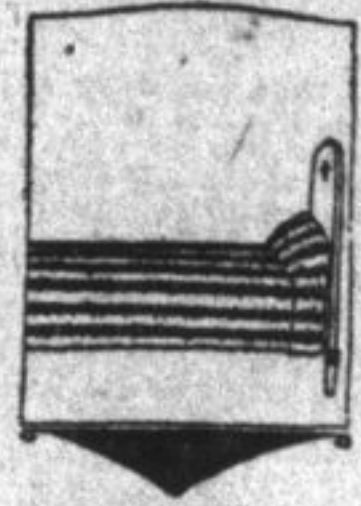

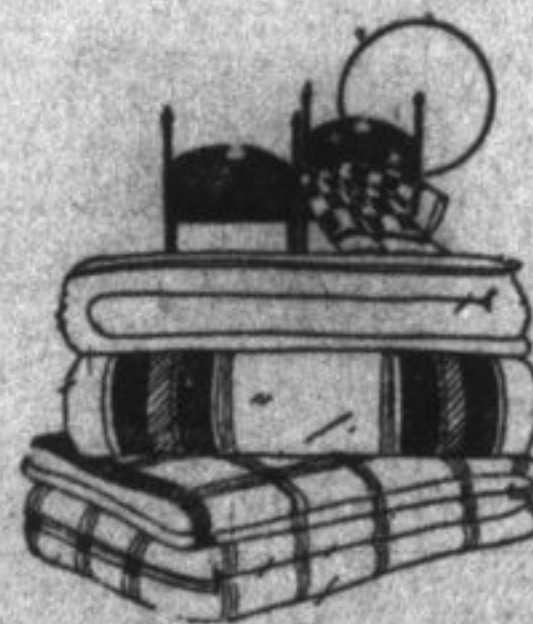
