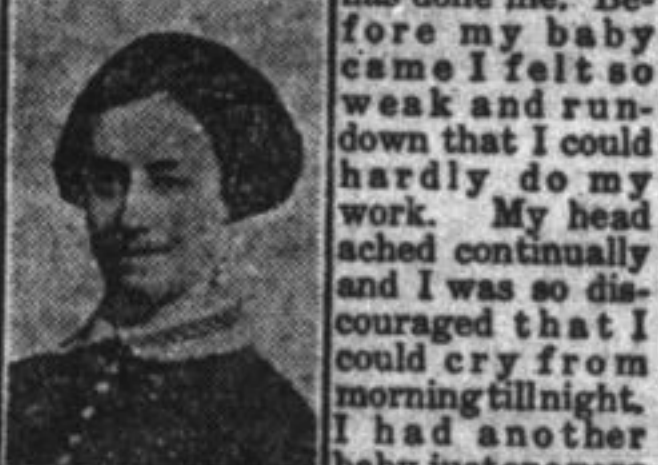

Condition—Veins too prominent on the upper surface of the hand. Diagnosis—While not serious in itself, this indicates a certain fault in circulation and detracts from the beauty of the hand. 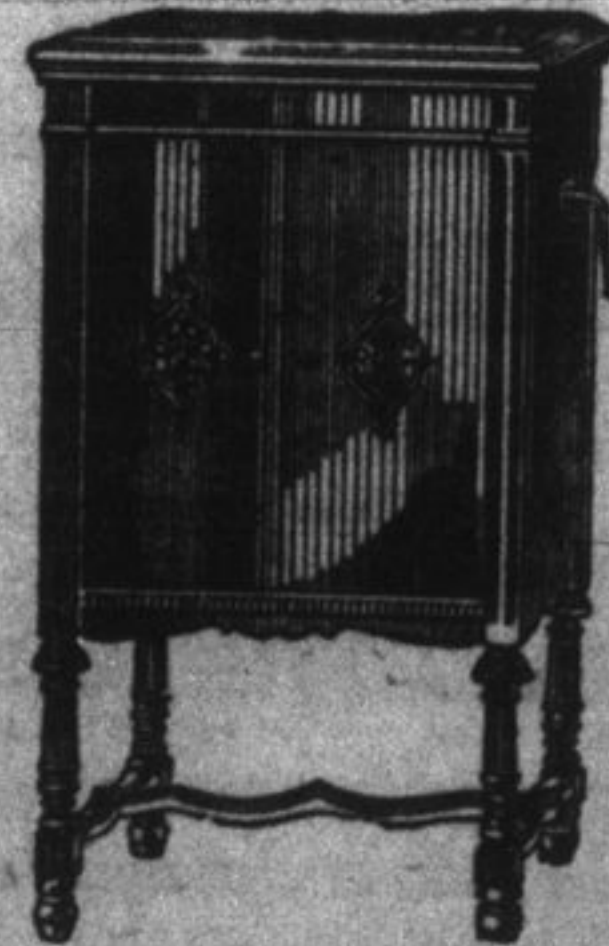
