**Injured In Collision.**  
On Friday evening, Fred Bevan, farmer who resides a short distance west of Prescott, was seriously injured when an automobile bearing a Quebec license collided with a hay wagon which he was driving. Mr. Bevan was thrown to the paved roadway by the force of the collision and is believed to have sustained a fracture of the skull. His condition is serious.

**A Rainy Sunday.**  
The very heavy rain which drenched this district on Sunday cut down the attendance at the churches very materially, interfered with plans for outings, and left the city streets deserted. Almost an inch of rain fell during the day and while the fall was not particularly heavy at any time, it was almost continuous until late afternoon. Mrs. Barrager, the widow, is a Belleville girl, a daughter of the late

Mr. H. Thompson, and a sister of Mrs. James Hudgins. The body will be brought to Belleville for interment.

**Coats For Sea Cadets.**  
The Kingston Sea Cadet Corps today received a supply of overcoats for the winter. Mr. Arthur Raven has for some time desired to have these coats for the boys, to make the appearance of the corps more uniform for the winter parades, and he has at last received the coats from the headquarters.

**Sentenced at Picton.**  
Frank Godfrey and Frank Sarley, recently tried at Belleville and Trenton, appeared on Friday on the charge of breaking and entering into the post office at Wapona. Godfrey was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary, to run consecutively with his punishment of five years in Trenton and Belleville. Frank Sarley was given one year, which, with the judgment of one year handed down to him at Belleville means that he will also have to go to the penitentiary.
