The spikes of the giadioli, so much used for decoration at this season of the year, are effective in a tall jar. The shades of pink of the rose tint deepening to a crimson, should be kept together and the salmon pink and the varying tones of that shade will make a charming picture together. Sweetpeas have a variety of tints that seem to blend in a mysterious way if left by themselves and are more etfective this way, cosmos too, never clash together but put them with scarlet geraniums or orange nasturtiums and they are at once lost as far as decorative work is concerned. 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
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
