## DEMPSEY PLEASSED WITH FIGHT SITE

### The Two Battlers Are Pitching Their Camps Near Philadelphia, Pa.

Philadelphia, Aug. 25.—Jack Dempsey, stopping off yesterday en route to his new training camp at Atlantic City, inspected the site for his heavyweight championship battle with Gene Tunney, September 23rd. The champion, together with his wife, Promoter Tex Rickard, Mayor Kendrick and others, visited the arena within the inclosure of the Sesqui-Centennial Exposition grounds.

Dempsey was highly impressed with the huge \$3,000,000 municipal stadium. As he looked about him, at the high tiers of seats, he exclaimed:

"This is a knockout of a place. What a spot it will be when it is filled up."

The title holder left for Atlantic City after a conference with Rickard. He intends to start training tomorrow provided that his camp is ready for him.

Tex Rickard has opened headquarters here, bringing with him a staff of assistants from Madison Square Garden. These executives are trained in handling tickets and other details. Rickard intends renting a building as permanent headquarters within a day or two.

Billy Gibson, manager of Tunney, came with Rickard to inspect several training sites offered the challenger. Among them is the Evergreen Farms, a country club on the outskirts of Philadelphia; a delegation from Wildwood, N.J., also presented a proposal to Gibson. He also received offers from Delaware Water Gap, Pa.

The battling of Floyd Herman, Brooklyn's first baseman, who came from Minneapolis, is proving one of the big features of the major league season.

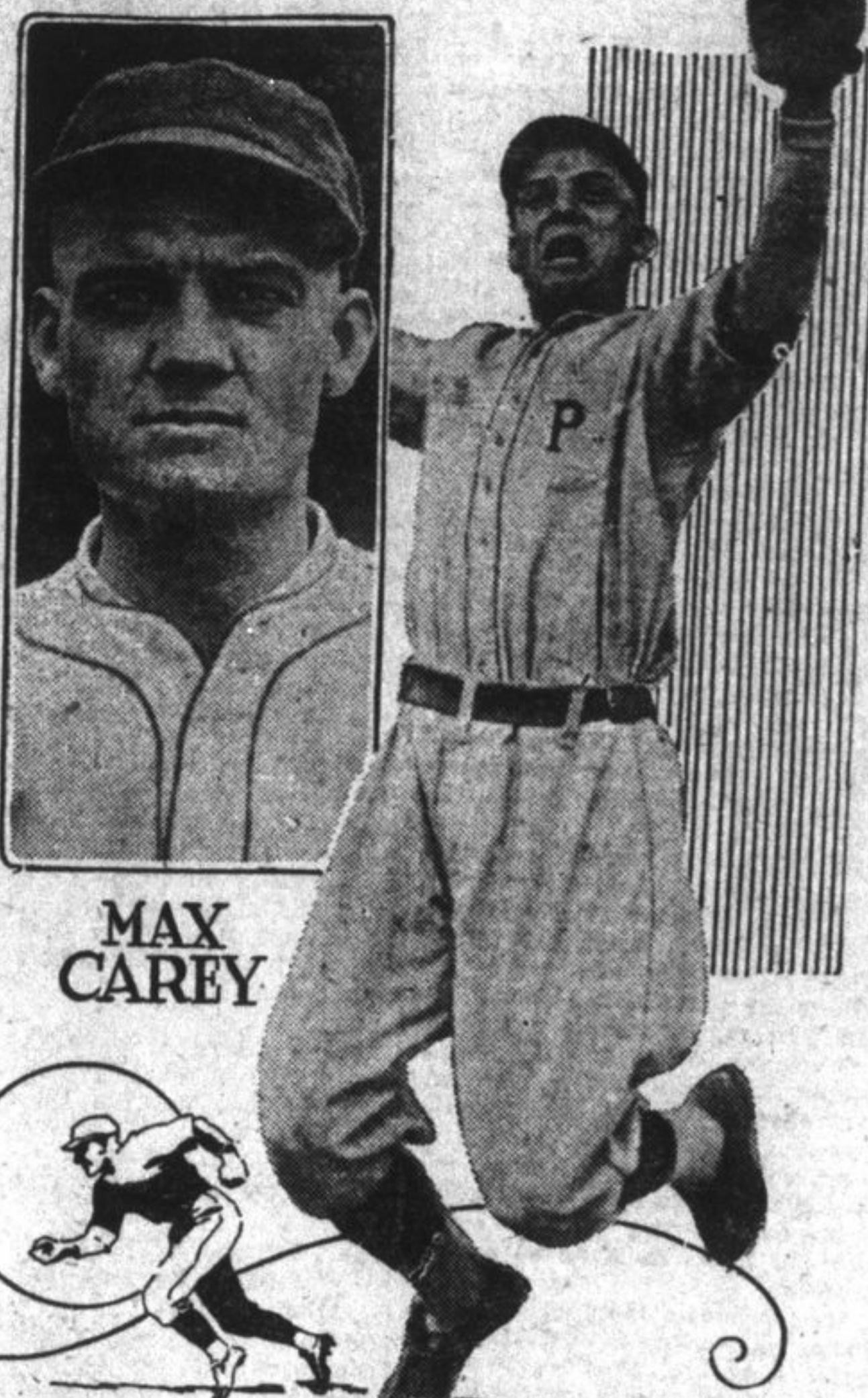

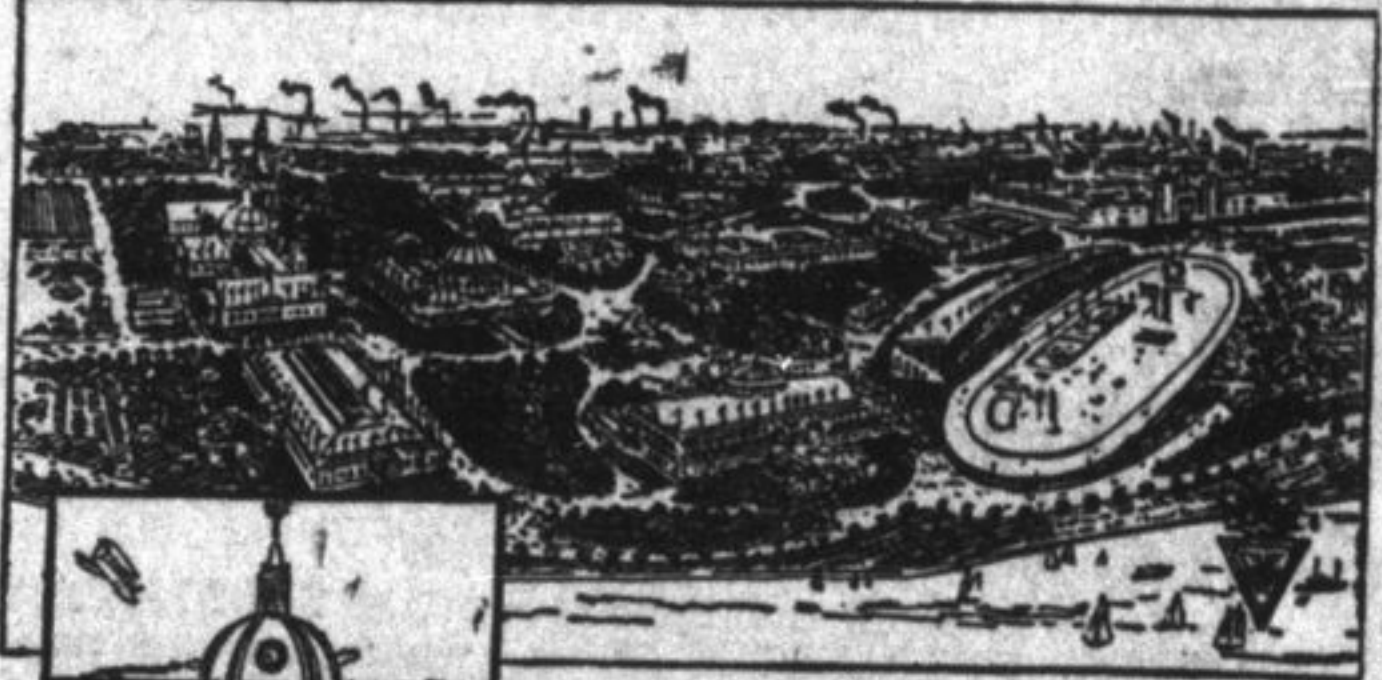

If you don't know the difference between a cause and rowboat, try the following. Step into one—if it whistles with you, it's a cause, if it doesn't it's a rowboat.

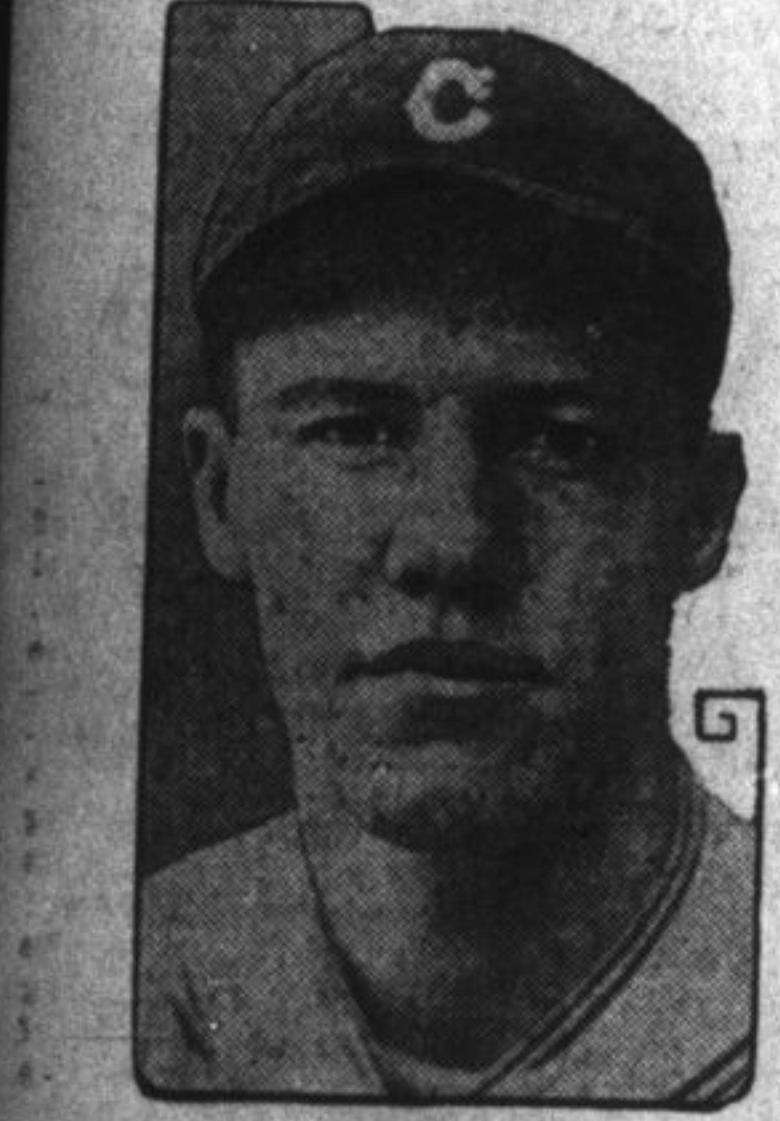

### OTTAWA FOOTBALL PRACTICES CALLED

The Gridders Will Get Down to Work Next Week in the Capital.

Ottawa, Aug. 25.—The Ottawa football team will get down to practice next Wednesday. This was decided on at an executive meeting, when plans for the coming gridiron campaign were discussed. There was a full attendance of officers, and Dr. Bert Sims presided over the gathering. Equipment will be dug up this week, and everything will be in full swing by the middle of next. The south end of Lansdowne Park will likely be used until the field is cleared in front of the grandstand.

Ottawa's prospects for retaining the Big Four and Dominion titles are very good. With the team practically intact, the local gridder, who made fame for the Capital last fall, are expected to again show the way.
