Parliament is Supreme. To the Editor of The Whig: Dear Sir—The Montreal Gazette, 28th Aug. (p. 7, 1st col), reports Mr. Meighen as having said at Winnipeg:— "Let them" (the Liberals), "even challenge any act of ours as illegal because we were not legally a government. If they succeed, I am prepared to resign the leadership of the Conservative party." "An order-in-council passed by the Government could be challenged in the courts," Mr. Meighen said. "If the Government were not legally constituted, the courts would declare the order invalid." Mr. Meighen knows—though it is hard to guess how little Mr. Meighen knows—Mr. Meighen ought to know that no inferior court—no, not the Sovereign himself—has jurisdiction over Parliament. Only Parliament itself can pass upon what Parliament does. A Cabinet is but a Committee of Parliament. Already Mr. Meighen's "shadow Government" has been challenged in Parliament, and by Parliament condemned. And Mr. Meighen stepped Parliament's face for its temerity. But consider consequences, Mr. Meighen would resign his party-leadership? "Oh, what a fall were there, my countrymen!" All along Mr. Meighen appears to have tried to act the party-leader, not the statesman, nor the patriot. Then we derive from opponents' flanders greater advantage than from our own schemes. GEO. **STOP SUNDAY WORK
AT GRAIN ELEVATOR**

Secretary of Lord's Day Alliance Gave Order to Have Elevator Closed. Rev. A. T. Terryberry, provincial secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, who preached at both services in the First Baptist Church, on Sunday, paid a visit to a local grain elevator on Sunday and stated that the elevator must not be operated on Sunday, and that it was against the law to operate on Sunday. The man in charge of the elevator stated that the elevator would not be closed down unless he was authorized to do so by the manager. Mr. Terryberry paid another visit to the elevator at 5 o'clock, in the afternoon, and the superintendent closed down. On Monday morning, Rev. Mr. Terryberry called on the manager of the elevator, when the manager informed him that the work at the elevator was being carried on in the usual way, that of having the vessels unloaded as soon as they arrive so they could get away without any delay. And as far as can be learned this appears to be the general practice all over the great lakes. At Fort William and Port Colborne the big elevators work on Sunday. This has been the practice for many years, and these elevators have not been interfered with. It is rumored that proceedings will also be taken to stop the steamers Waubic and Brockville running out of here on Sunday, but as these steamers are operating on their regular routes, and as these water trips are very popular, it is not probable that the people of Kingston will allow these boat trips to be cancelled. No complaint was made to the head of the local police force regarding the operation of the elevator on Sunday.

**Dropped Dead on
Way to Kingston**

It was learned in the city Monday morning that Vahram Y. Davoud had dropped dead in the New York Central station, New York City, Saturday night, while about to board a train for Kingston. A friend telephoned to his wife, who has been staying on Wolfe Island with her father, and she immediately left for New York. Mrs. Davoud was formerly Constance Tandy, a daughter of Mr. Harry Tandy, King street. Mr. Davoud was born in Constantinople, and was forty-six years old. He was an electrical engineer, a graduate of Yale university, and was connected with the Electric Bond and Share Company of New York. His residence was in Montclair, New Jersey. He is survived by his wife, three sons, Paul, Tandy, Gordon at present in Kingston, and three sisters, Miss N. Davoud, New York, Mrs. Donchian, Hartford, Conn., and one sister in England. The body is expected to arrive in Kingston Tuesday and the funeral will take place from the home of his father-in-law, Mr. Harry Tandy, 151 King street, Tuesday to Cataract cemetery.

687 Names Added. **PREMIER MEIGHEN
PREDICTS MAJORITY**

He Says the Conservatives Will Make Gains in Western Canada. Kenora, Ont., Aug. 30.—"There is no doubt that the Conservatives will have a substantial majority," says Premier Meighen in a statement issued yesterday on the completion of his western tour. "I have not," the statement reads, "contracted the habit of making election predictions, but this can be said as a generally accepted fact rather than as a prediction: The Conservative party will have more seats in Western Canada than they won in the election of last October. I am absolutely confident that we will gain in each of the four western provinces."

**FOUR FUGITIVES
ARE RECAPTURED**

Courage of Deputy Warden Prevented General Delivery of 1,400 Prisoners. Ionia, Mich., Aug. 30.—Twenty of the twenty-four convicts who escaped from the state reformatory here Saturday morning, after overpowering twenty guards, are still at liberty apparently having scattered in various directions. Four were recaptured during Saturday and are in solitary confinement, facing the possibility of three years' additional imprisonment for their short freedom. The break, soon after 1.30 o'clock in the morning, was one of the boldest in the history of Michigan penal institutions. For a time five men, leaders in the escape, were in virtual possession of the prison. Among the leaders were Benton Ford and Franklin Todd of Toledo, sentenced for holding up the Hadley State Bank in Lapeer County some months ago. That many of the other 1,400 inmates of the prison did not join the twenty-four who got out was due largely to the courage of Ed. Haight, Deputy Warden. Summoned from his home by an outer guard, Mr. Haight ran to the scene and arrived as a large group of inmates were coming through the main entrance. Firing his rifle over the heads, Haight forced them back into the prison. No one was severely wounded. Only the leaders of the escaped convicts appear to have been armed. Where they obtained the weapons has not been determined.

ZION CHURCH, PITTSBURGH.

Re-opening Services Were Held There on Sunday. Zion United Church, which has been closed for some time undergoing repairs was re-opened on Sunday. In the morning, Rev. J. K. Curtis, B.A., of Princess street United Church, preached the sermon. Rev. Mr. McFarland, of St. John's church, Pittsburg, preached in the evening. At both services the church was filled to capacity, and some could not gain admittance. A splendid solo was rendered in the morning by Mrs. Clinton Grice, and in the evening, Miss Etta Dowler sang beautifully.

Mr. Charles Hick, of the Kingston Command of the Canadian Legion is in Toronto this week attending a meeting of the Legion Council. Mr. Fraser Armstrong, superintendent of the General Hospital, is back at his desk after undergoing a similar operation.

**CHIEF ARMSTRONG
AGAIN SECRETARY**

Elected to Office in Dominion Fire Chiefs' Association Twelfth Time. Fire Chief James Armstrong has just returned from Windsor where he attended the convention of the Dominion Association of Fire Chiefs held on August 24th, 25th, 26th and 27th. There was a very large attendance at the convention members being present from as far as Halifax and as far west as Lethbridge. The meetings were very interesting and instructive, among the topics being discussed were, the proper care of motor fire apparatus, and the capabilities of different sized water mains and their efficiency in supplying good hose streams. This was especially instructive and it was the general opinion that all four inch mains should be removed from service and all dead ends in water system eliminated. The question of automobile congestion and parking of cars on streets caused a long discussion and every chief who spoke complained that the work of the fire departments was being hindered from this cause. Traffic control was ably explained by Commissioner Tason of Windsor where the automatic street signal control system has been installed; and which appears to be working well. The signals change every 50 seconds, so that there is very little delay occasioned to traffic which is held up by the red light. The efficiency of the hand water pump as compared with the three gallon chemical acid and soda extinguisher was also discussed and it was decided that the hand pump was decidedly more efficient for the majority of the smaller fires. At the Friday morning session the officers were elected for the ensuing year. Hull, Quebec, was selected for the 1927 convention. The officers elected were as follows: President—Chief Jessier, Hull, Que. 1st Vice-President—Chief G. M. Brady, North Bay. 2nd Vice-President—Chief R. N. O. Harrington, McCall Oil Refiners, Montreal. Secretary—Chief James Armstrong, Kingston. Treasurer—Chief R. McLeod, Fort Arthur. Chairman of Exhibit Committee—Chief A. Debeau, Verdun, Que. Members of Board of Directors—Chief James Hartley, Brockville, Chief T. Airth, Renfrew. The Ladies' Auxiliary also met during the convention and it was decided to present a silk Canadian flag, suitably mounted to the International Association, in commemoration of the fact that this year that Association has for the first time in fifty-four years being presided over by a Canadian born fire chief. On only two previous occasions has a Canadian chief been president. Chief Z. Benoit of Montreal, elected 1894 and Chief John Thompson of Toronto, elected 1910. The election of officers resulted in Mrs. James Armstrong, Kingston, as president; Mrs. G. Y. Deacon of Lechute Mills, Que., as vice-president and Mrs. A. B. Kappelle of Stratford as secretary-treasurer. Mrs. Jessier of Hull was made honorary president.
