The two other attacks which stand out owing to their ferocity have happened in comparatively recent years. About twelve years ago a prisoner named Chimonski, who was released this year on the completion of his term, attacked Guard Dowdsley and Scout Tatton and injured them both so severely that he almost crippled them for life. Chimonski was working with Guard Dowdsley on some carpentry work in a building on the prison farm. Scout Tatton came up and leaving his horse outside came into the building to talk to the guard. Chimonski took them unawares, and after beating them with a hatchet which he was using in the carpentry work, he rushed out of the building, stole the scout's horse and got away. Other Murderous Attacks.
The murder of Guard Jenkins at the penitentiary on Saturday has turned the thoughts of those associated with the institution to the several similar murderous attacks made by convicts on the guards during the many years that the penitentiary has been situated at Portmuth. The only other actual murder was the Trail case in 1867. Guard Trail was overpowered by two convicts at the old lime kiln after a hard struggle and he was trussed up and left lying in the kiln, while the men made off. It is not probable that the injuries suffered by Trail at the hands of the convicts would have resulted in his death but in his struggles to get free and give the alarm he turned on his face in the slacked lime, and unable to get out of this position he smothered to death.

Ladies and Gentlemen:—
