

Kingston Wins the Central Ontario Championship For 1926 Season

KINGSTON AGAIN WON CENTRAL ONTARIO CHAMPIONSHIP DEFEATING BELLEVILLE 13-5

Kingston Sluggers Knocked Ouellet Out of the Box and Finished Up on Goyer—Fighting Spirit of Local Team Had Much to Do With Yesterday's Victory—Cairns Was on the Mount—Brilliant Plays by Local Players—Kingston Club Goes into Playoffs.

Outbitting the Belleville Trunks 17-9 and fielding with much snap, the Kingston seniors yesterday won the Central Ontario championship at Belleville and qualified for the senior play-off series by winning the third and deciding game of the final series by the score of 13-5.

With the old fight in them again, Kingston went to bat first, having lost the toss up for the field.

With two out and Cherry on second, Britton slammed for three bases scoring Cherry. Purvis followed with a single to put Britton across.

Not to be outdone in starting off, Belleville worked for two runs in the first inning. Weir fled to first.

With the score 4-3 for Kingston at the end of the third, play tightened and it looked like a hard go.

The Belleville team, while they had a chance, gave Kingston trouble but their last hope was gone before the seventh frame was finished.
