WANT NOMINATION SPEECHES IN EVENING

Mr. James Halliday, Liberal Candidate, Ready to Meet Machinists' Wishes.

On Wednesday morning Mr. Jas. Halliday, Liberal candidate for the riding of Kingston and Portsmouth, in the coming federal election, received a letter from the Local Machinists' Union, asking that the speeches of the candidates on nomination day be given in the evening instead of following the nominations which are held in the forenoon.

Speaking to a British Whig representative, Mr. Halliday stated that he was ready to accede to the wishes of the machinists, so it is altogether likely that the necessary arrangements will be made to have the addresses delivered in the evening. Nominations will be held on Tuesday next, Sept. 7th.

The Biggest Grain Cargo of Season

The steamer Oakton, of the Matthews Line, which passed down Wednesday morning, was carrying the largest load of grain carried yet this season. She had in her hold 84,773 bushels of No. 1 hard wheat.

SEVERELY DAMAGED BY GREAT TIDAL WAVE

Village in Azores Suffers From Earthquake — Hospital Full of Injured.

Horta, Azores, Sept. 1.—Several shocks have been felt here since the first quake yesterday morning. The village of Fetra has been severely damaged by a tidal wave.

The first violent shock occurred at 11.40 a.m. Fayal Island and neighboring islands were affected. Many houses were shaken down.

The shock is said to be the most severe experienced since 1870.

The local hospital is full of injured. Eight were killed and 200 injured. Soldiers have been called out to guard the road and the town buildings abandoned by their owners. Many houses considered earthquake-proof fell in the tremor. The people are unnerved and most of them spent last night in the open.

Other messages from Azores reiterate requests for aid. A message sent by the mayor of Horta to the authorities in Lisbon said the aspect of Fayal Island and the suffering of the victims were terrible to witness. The catastrophe was beyond description. Large cracks have appeared in the streets.

Quake in Chile.

Santiago, Chile, Sept. 1.—A strong earthquake was felt early yesterday afternoon in the town of Valenar, northern Chile. No casualties are reported. The populace was greatly alarmed.

MONTREAL AUDIENCE HEARS THE PREMIER

Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen Speaks at Forum With Hon. E. L. Patenaude.

Montreal, Sept. 1.—The Conservatives of Montreal thronged the Forum building last night to hear Premier Meighen and Hon. E. L. Patenaude open their election campaign in this part of the Dominion. Distinguished visitors on the stage included many Conservative candidates from Quebec province. Conspicuous in the front row were Sir Alfred and Lady Mond. The Conservative leaders were accorded a responsive audience. There were interruptions from time to time, but they were all in a friendly vein.

Mr. Patenaude said that he had endorsed Mr. Meighen's leadership because he believed the time had come when by doing so he could best fulfill his duty to Quebec province and to himself. He said the return of the Conservative party would bring stable government.

Mr. Meighen spoke at some length in French. He stressed two issues—the customs probe and the constitutional question. He appealed to the electors "to punish the wrong and establish the right," maintaining that while all governments had been compelled to fight smuggling from time immemorial, "the Mackenzie King Government went into partnership with smugglers."

On the constitution issue Mr. Meighen repeated his charge that former Premier King had sought to dissolve parliament only because he feared a vote of censure and, Mr. Meighen added: "When Baron Byng refused to dissolve Parliament to prevent a censure of the King Government he did more to uphold responsible government in Canada than Mr. King will do until the day he dies." As long as Canada had men of the stamp of Byng at Government House, there need be no misgivings about the freedom of Canada, the premier declared.

MORE CARE IS NEEDED IN DRIVING OF CARS

Series of Accidents Due to Negligence on the Part of Drivers.

A motor accident which seems to be growing very common, particularly in this district, is for one automobile to run into the back of another car, which happens to be standing on the highway. Magistrate J. W. Bradshaw had three cases of this kind before him in County Police Court this week, and several others of a like nature have occurred during the summer.

If the parked car has its tail-light lit, there would seem to be very little excuse for anyone running into it, but it happens too frequently that the driver of the car, secure in the knowledge that his front lights are burning, takes it for granted that the tail light is also in working order. When a driver finds it necessary to park his car on the road at night to change a tire or because of engine trouble, he should get over as far as possible to his right side of the highway and make sure that his tail light is burning. Likewise, other drivers on the road should keep their minds strictly on the driving, and even if the tail light of a parked car is not burning, the headlights of the approaching car should show it up in plenty of time to prevent an accident. More care would eliminate many motor accidents.

CRERAR SPEAKING IN MANITOBA RIDINGS

Former Progressive Leader Believes Conservatives Would Increase Rail Tariff.

Winnipeg, Sept. 1.—Hon. Charles A. Dunning, former Minister of Railways, and Hon. T. A. Crerar, former leader of the Progressive party, are conducting an extensive speaking tour in Manitoba this week.

Mr. Crerar opened his campaign at Missetos, speaking in the interest of J. Allison-Glen, Progressive-Liberal candidate. The former leader of the Progressives dealt at great length with the question of railway rates, and charged that if the Conservative party was returned to power there was a "grave danger of the statutory protection being removed from the Crow's Nest Pass rates." If this occurred Western Canada would pay at least \$20,000,000 more than if did last year for moving the grain crop. The Crow's Nest agreement and the statutory protection clause is embodied in the law of the country, said Mr. Crerar.

"I have taken the position all along that this was an agreement that should be lived up to," he added. "That is the stand of the Liberal party to-day, and it is beyond the power of the Railway Commission to interfere with that law. Mr. Meighen takes the stand that the Railway Commission must deal with the question. It is the policy of the Conservative party to remove the statutory protection."

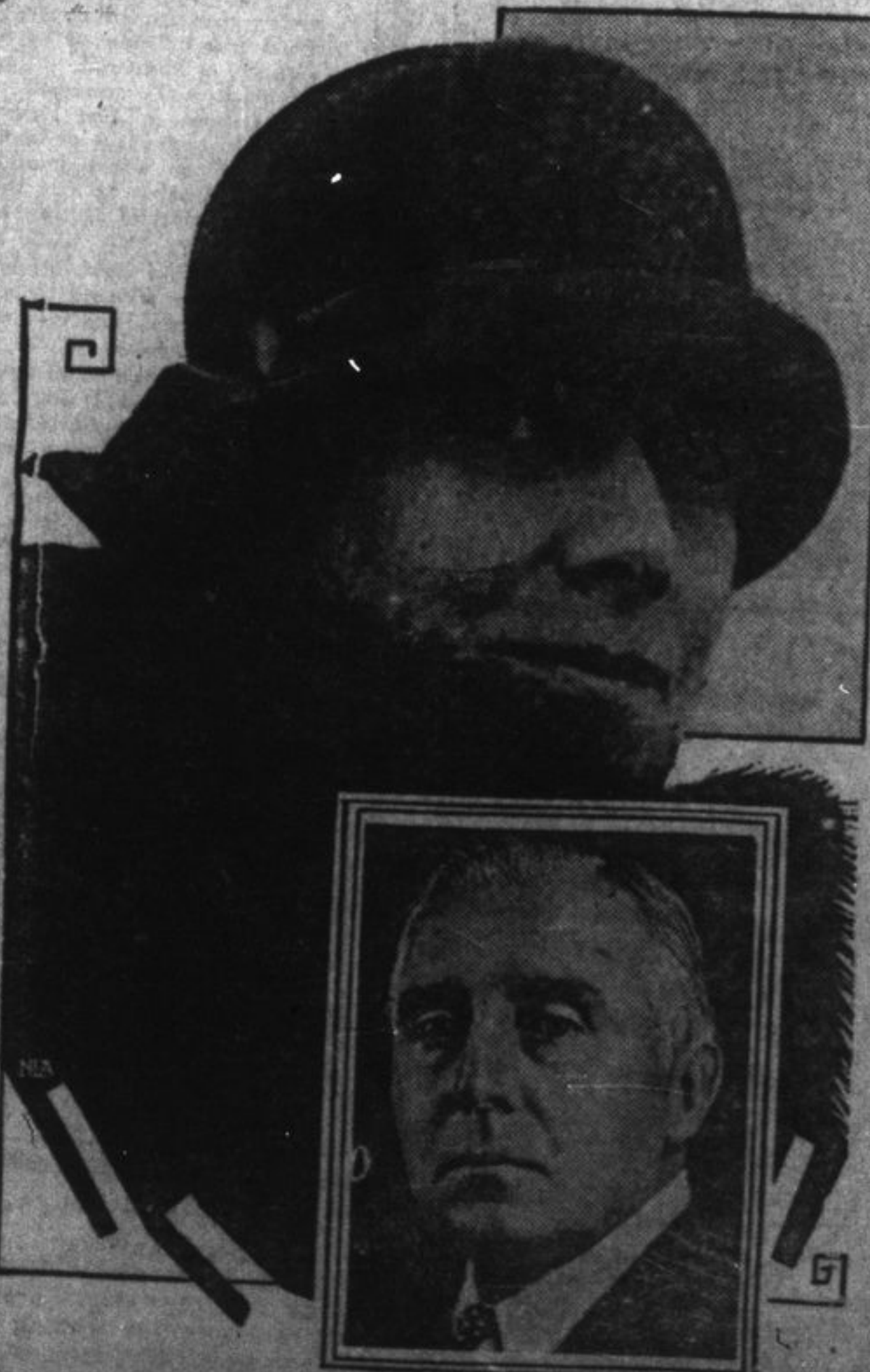
Mr. Crerar also criticized the tariff policy of the Conservative party, and said his only criticism of the Liberal party was that it had not gone far enough in reducing duties it had, however, gone in the right direction.
