LOCAL POLICE ASKED TO ASSIST IN SEARCH

Joseph Sottile, an Italian, Wanted in Connection With Poison Alcohol Cases.

The Kingston police have received a communication from the provincial police department, asking the officers here to keep a sharp look-out for one, Joseph Sottile, an Italian, aged thirty-five years, who is alleged to be one of the "high-ups" in the traffic of poison alcohol, which recently left its trail of death in the Toronto-Hamilton and Parry Sound districts. Sottile is wanted on a charge of manslaughter, and the sum of \$2,000 will be paid by the Ontario Government for the arrest or such information as will lead to the arrest of Sottile.
