Drowned in St. Lawrence. The body of Frank Garske, aged sixty-eight, a patient in the St. Lawrence State Hospital, Ogdensburg, N.Y., who escaped from that institution September 1st, was found floating in the St. Lawrence River on Monday night. Garske came from Western Canada and was entered at the hospital April 24th, 1926. It is believed he was attempting to swim across the river.

Jailed; Dies in Hospital. A few days ago Harry Bookhouse, an aged man from Deseronto, was sent to the Belleville county jail as a vagrant. He was taken ill shortly after and sent to the local hospital, where he died on Tuesday. It was stated at the time of his appearance in Deseronto that the man came from Dupéras county. An inquest was held and a verdict of death from natural causes was recorded.

School Classes Filled. The public school classes are reported to be very full, but the classes do not seem to be so crowded as they were last year, due to the use of the new Rideau school. The schools in the north end of the city have the largest attendance.

The collegiate has plenty of room owing to the removal of the commercial department to the old Louis school. The commercial department will take possession of their new quarters Monday.

Married at Trenton. A wedding took place on Sept. 7, when Miss Lela May Hyde, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Webster Hyde, Trenton, was united in marriage to Stan. R. Thorpe, Hamilton, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Mason M. Thorpe, Brinston. Rev. Dr. Lorne Pierce officiating. The happy couple left immediately after the ceremony by boat for Montreal and Quebec. On their return they will live in Hamilton.

Buildings and Crops Destroyed. Roy Topping, who resides about a mile west of Algonquin, suffered a heavy loss on Tuesday night when his barn, outbuildings, machinery and crops were destroyed by fire of unknown origin. The fire broke out about ten o'clock and continued for over two hours before burning itself out. With great difficulty the residence on the farm was saved. Some insurance was carried, but the loss will be heavy.

Passed Away at Napanee. Ann Huff, wife of Albert Bartlett, Napanee, passed away quite suddenly on Monday. Mrs. Bartlett had been ill for some weeks with heart trouble and though it was known that her condition was serious, the end came unexpectedly. Deceased was a native of Napanee. Besides her husband she leaves two sons, Messrs. Harold Bartlett, Rochester, N.Y., and Roy Bartlett, New York. Also her father, H. W. Huff, and a sister and brother. The funeral took place from her late residence, Bridge street, on Wednesday.

Has Option on Boat Lines. George J. Izzy, real estate dealer, Watertown, N.Y., has secured options for the property and rights of the owners of four boat lines at Alexandria Bay. The sixteen boats have a total carrying capacity of 882. These four lines carry the bulk of the people who leave the docks at Alexandria Bay for motor boat trips during the summer season. It is estimated that more than \$100,000 is taken in by the four companies during the season, these tours being the only method by which the tourists to the Thousand Islands are enabled to visit the many islands and spots of historical interest on the St. Lawrence river.
