Further Allegations Made Against Tory Minister of Customs Stevens

Vancouver Sun Claims He Feared Disclosures Would Ruin Him Politically—Million Dollars Taken From People for Worthless Stock—Blind Toronto Lady Loses \$8,000 in Deal.

Vancouver, B.C., Sept. 10.—Following its allegation that Hon. H. H. Stevens, Minister of Customs in the Meighen Cabinet, had improperly used Canadian House of Commons notepaper in connection with the promotion of oil stock sales, The Vancouver Sun, under an Ottawa dateline yesterday, prints the following:

"Further disclosures concerning Hon. H. H. Stevens' connection with the Canadian-United States Oil and Refining Corporation of Chicago, while acting as director and officer of that concern, came to light today. It now develops that, in addition to a letter written by Mr. Stevens on Nov. 4, 1922, on House of Commons notepaper and broadcast throughout the United States and Canada by stock salesmen, Mr. Stevens made further use of the Canadian coat-of-arms paper to prospective shareholders of the company. According to information, the company, which was incorporated under the laws of Delaware in March, 1921, failed in November, 1922, after paying dividends of 2 per cent. almost from its inception, and was reorganized in 1923.

Extracts From Memorandum. "Three extracts from a memorandum accompanying the letter which Mr. Stevens wrote to one shareholder a few months before the company failed follow:

"1. The company is also free from any obligation to the public, except some small current accounts.

"2. In addition to this, this company's standing is such that it is in a position to purchase other valuable leases adjacent to its own at very moderate rates.

"3. In conclusion, I beg to state that this company has, in my opinion, proceeded on sound business lines, that it has emerged from the condition of a promotion scheme to that of an established industrial concern."

Talk of Political Ruin. The article published in The Sun says pathetic letters from widows and other poor people are constantly coming to the company complaining of serious losses, and alleges evidence has been gathered to the effect that at a time when the company had paid \$227,000 in dividends it did not have more than \$600 or \$700 in the bank, and that when this condition was drawn to the attention of Mr. Stevens he still urged continuance, as otherwise disclosures would ruin him politically.

The article further alleges: "That more than \$1,000,000 was taken out of the pockets of people in Canada, United States and England for worthless stock.

"That there are in all 2,400 share holders, a large number of whom live in Vancouver and the second largest number in Ottawa."

Blind Widow Loses \$8,000. On its editorial page The Sun, under the caption "New Use for Canadian Coat of Arms," says:

"Neither defences from the Conservatives nor attacks from the Liberals can alter the position which Mr. Stevens finds himself in with respect to using the Canadian coat of arms to promote wildcat oil deals. "All Mr. Stevens has to do is to tell the people of Canada, why he went to Chicago, why he took with him to Chicago, quantities of House of Commons writing paper; why he (Mr. Stevens), while in Chicago, wrote on that House of Commons letter paper to wildcat oil firms in Chicago.

"Does Mr. Stevens seriously ask this public to believe that it was not his intention that the coat of arms of Canada should be used to influence the sale of American wildcat oil stock?"

"Mr. Stevens should tell the Vancouver public how many lithographed copies were made in Chicago of this House of Commons letter; how many people were influenced by this letter to separate from their good money, and what was the total amount and such money gathered in by his company.

Wildcat Company.

"Could Mr. Stevens help but know that people who were influenced by those letters were in some cases widows? Does Mr. Stevens not know that in one case a Toronto widow who put in her entire savings of \$8,000 is a cripple and is blind? Can he give any believable answer to show that he did not know that women all over the United States were influenced by this authority and security of the coat of arms of Canada to invest their savings in this wildcat company?"

"After prostituting the Canadian coat of arms to annex American dollars for his own wildcat oil schemes, should Mr. Stevens come back to Vancouver and endeavor to kill our good, legitimate tourist business and stir up international feeling with his annexation and anti-American campaign?"

PICTON FAIR RACES WERE CALLED OFF

Owing to the Rain on Thursday—The Pageant Staged on Thursday Night.

Pictou, Sept. 10.—Rain spoiled the third and last day of Pictou Fair and was responsible for a very small attendance. The track was a sea of mud, and the races, the grand parade of prize winners and other events before the grandstand had to be called off. Late in the afternoon the weather cleared but too late to be of much help.

The pageant "The International Circus" was staged before the grandstand last night, however, and delighted the audience as on the two preceding nights. This form of entertainment has proved a great success, and does credit to the ability of

local talent. In the Armouries to-night, too, there was the annual fair day dances with Cooper's Orchestra playing and 250 couples in attendance.

There is a large possibility that next year's fair will be a four-day affair as a result of this year's disastrous experience with rain, the extra day being the best form of rain insurance in sight.
