PALMERSTON-CANONTO.
Minutes of council meeting held on August 23rd. All members present except McKinnon. Minutes of last meeting were read and adopted. Communications were read.
By-law 264 was passed, levying the rates as follows: County rate, 12 mills; township rate, 18 mills; school rate, 18 mills; total, 54 mills.
Moved, Herman-Mundell, that the following accounts be paid: Whig Publishing Company, printing voters' list, \$63; James Isatt, 200 posts at 8c. each, \$16; James Simpson, for sheep killed and damaged, \$14; William Love, valuating sheep, \$3; Whig Publishing Company, advertising Court of Revision, \$12; John Lee, groceries and ticket to hospital for John Mills, \$10; David Olmstead, road work, \$12.53; Robert Ferguson, road work, \$12.
Moved by Geddes-Mundell, that Olmstead and Ferguson road work be charged to the various divisions.

Moved by John Gillespie seconded by Thomas Garrah that by-law 259 be read first time.
Moved by Thomas Garrah seconded by James Lachance that by-law 259 be read second and third time. Signed and sealed.
Moved by John Gillespie seconded by Thomas Garrah that the Bell Telephone Co. be given permission to lay a line between lot 5 and 6.

By-law 259 of the municipal corporation of the township of Howe Island for the purpose of levying and collecting certain sums of money (1) for county purposes, (2) township purposes, (3) separate school purposes, (4) road and bridge purposes.
Whereas it is necessary to pass a by-law for the aforesaid purposes it is therefore enacted and it is hereby enacted that the sums of \$4,534 be levied and collected on the whole rateable property in the township of Howe Island; for county purposes \$1,800, for township purposes \$400, for separate school purposes \$1,300, for road and bridge purposes \$1,034, school section No. 1, \$600; school section No. 2, \$300; school section No. 3, \$400; and be it therefore enacted that the above sums be levied and collected on the rateable property in the township of Howe Island, and paid to township treasurer on or before the 15th day of December, 1925.

Motion, Botting-Howes, that a grant of \$20 be made to school fair and grant of \$50 to Hinchinbrooke Agricultural Society.—Carried.
Motion, Jackson-Botting, that the following order be paid: A. W. Sirett, school fair, \$30.—Carried.
Motion, Howes-Campbell, that this council adjourn to meet at Piccadilly the last Saturday in September, or at call of reeve.—Carried.
