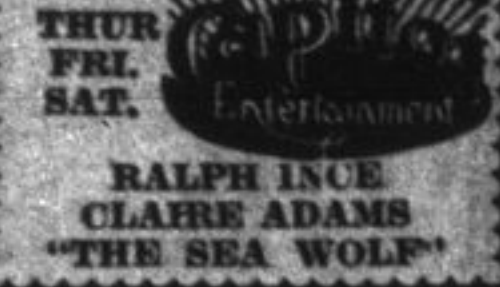

THE LIBERAL PARTY TRIUMPHS AT THE POLLS

Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King Will Have Working Majority—Premier Meighen Defeated

PREMIER AND FIVE MINISTERS MET WITH SEVERE DEFEAT

All Former Liberal Ministers Who Ran Were Elected—Liberal Leader King Will Easily Have a Voting Strength in the Next House of Around 130.

Ottawa, Sept. 15.—The Conservative Government of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen met with defeat at the polls yesterday. The Prime Minister himself failed to secure election in Portage la Prairie, Man., and five of his ministers, three of them from the province of Quebec, were defeated.

Members of the Government, in addition to Premier Meighen, who were defeated yesterday are: Hon. E. L. Patenaude, Minister of Justice; Hon. Andre Fauteux, Solicitor-General; Hon. Eugene Paquet, Minister of Health and Soldiers' Re-establishment, and two ministers without portfolio, Hon. Donald Sutherland and Hon. Raymond Morand.

On the other hand, the Liberal party, headed by the Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King, constitute the largest group in the new Parliament of Canada, Mr. King and all the members of his former Government who contested ridings were returned by the electorate, Mr. King was elected in Prince Albert, Sask.

A summary of the party standing, based on the latest available returns, follows: Liberals, 113; Conservatives, 90; Progressives, 7; Liberal-Progressives, 11; United Farmers Alberta, 11; Labor, 3; Independents, 2; doubtful, 3; total, 245.

The party standing after the election of October, 1925, was as follows: Conservatives, 118; Liberals, 102; Progressives, 23; Labor, 2; Independents, 2; total, 245.

FORMER LIBERAL MINISTERS WIN.

Former ministers in the King Government, in addition to the Liberal leader, who were re-elected are: Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Hon. P. J. Cardin, Hon. Lucien Cannon, Hon. J. A. Robb, Hon. J. O. Elliott, Hon. W. R. Motherwell, Hon. C. A. Dunning, Hon. J. H. King and Hon. Charles Stewart. Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, Speaker of the last two Parliaments, was re-elected in his constituency of Gaspé, Que. In Queens, P.E.I., Hon. J. E. Sinclair, formerly minister without portfolio in the King Government, who was defeated in the general election last October, was returned. Hon. James Murdoch, former Minister of Labor under Premier King, met defeat in High Park, Toronto.

WHAT KING CAN COUNT UPON.

The Liberal leader can count assuredly on the support of Mr. Bourassa, independent member for Labelle, but who has not, during the late campaign, lost an opportunity of attacking Mr. Meighen. He can also count with some certainty on the support of three Labor members, A. A. Heaps of Winnipeg North and Rev. J. S. Woodworth of Winnipeg North Centre, who gave him pretty consistent support last session, as well as a new recruit to the Labor ranks, H. B. Adhead of Calgary East. In addition there is the whole Progressive body increased from a couple of dozen to about thirty members, lacking indeed the cohesion with which it emerged from the 1925 election, but offering Mr. King presumably the consistent support of the Liberal-Progressives, whose candidature was severally endorsed by separate Progressive and Liberal nominations and successful yesterday to the number of eleven.

THE SUPPORT OF FORKE.

They include in their number Mr. Forke, recognized last session as the Progressive leader, whose influence with the party as a whole is apt to be thrown in support of Mr. King. It is not a secret that a year ago Mr. Forke was willing to enter the Liberal-Progressive coalition, himself taking the portfolio of agriculture. Even, therefore, Mr. King can not rally to his support any of seven "straight" Progressives, among whom Miss Agnes MacPhail gave him uniform support almost throughout last session, or the eleven U.F.A. members from Alberta, he yet has in eight Liberals, Labor, Independents and Liberal-Progressives, a voting strength of about 130, giving him quite a respectable majority on divisions. Immediate interest, of course, centres on the course Mr. Meighen may elect to pursue.

LOSE THEIR DEPOSITS.

HON. ROBERT ROGERS AMONG THE DEFEATED

The Conservative Leader of the West Loses His Fight in Winnipeg.

Ottawa, Sept. 15.—One of the most prominent members of the Conservative party to suffer defeat in Manitoba was Hon. Robert Rogers. This province returned no Conservatives in the last House of Commons. In British Columbia, Hon. R. H. Stevens, who made charges which precipitated the customs investigation, and one of the most bitter debates in the annals of a Canadian parliament, was elected. Mr. Stevens is Minister of Customs.

Miss MacPhail Wins.

Of the two women who contested ridings, one was elected, Miss Agnes MacPhail, Progressive, who has represented South East Grey for five years in the House of Commons, was returned once more by electors of that constituency. In East Toronto Miss Kathleen Bennett, Liberal, was defeated by Hon. E. B. Ryckman, Minister of Public Works. In Algoma East G. B. Nicholson, a prominent member of the Conservative party, and one of its most active parliamentary debaters during the last session, met with defeat at the hands of Beniah Bowman, formerly minister of the Ontario legislature.

William Duff Defeated.

Returns from the Maritimes registered defeat for William Duff, in Queens-Lunenburg, Nova Scotia. Mr. Duff was deputy speaker during the life of the last parliament. Another candidate who was much in the public eye and who went down to defeat was A. J. Doucet in the constituency of Kent, N.B. On the stump, Mr. Doucet, who was a member of the parliamentary committee which investigated the Department of Customs and Excise during the last session, made statements in regard to alleged "loopholes" on the steamer Margaret by members of the former Liberal Government.

26 LIBERALS ARE ELECTED IN ONTARIO

Thirteen Gains Made From the Conservatives by Mackenzie King's Party.

Toronto, Sept. 15.—With the victory conceded by a small majority of W. H. Taylor, Liberal, in the riding of Norfolk-Elgin, hitherto placed in the doubtful column in the representation from Ontario in the next House of Commons will be as follows: Liberals 26, Conservatives 52, Progressives 2, Liberal-Progressives 2. These figures indicate thirteen Liberal gains from the Conservatives, one Progressive gain from the Conservatives, and one Liberal-Progressive gain from the Conservatives.

The feature of the election contest in Ontario was the swing to Liberalism in several Western Ontario constituencies evidenced by the return to the Liberal column of seats which in former days, were considered safe Liberal strongholds. This was particularly true in Oxford, Grey, Bruce, Huron, Perth, Lambton, and Kent counties, while Elgin formerly considered a Conservative stronghold, returned two Liberals. Liberal gains were also made in the northern and eastern parts of the province, while the central and southern sections remained solidly Conservative.

"I CONGRATULATE THE KING PARTY"

Says Sir Henry Drayton, Who Expresses His View of the Result.

Toronto, Sept. 15.—"I congratulate the King party on its return to power," said Sir Henry Drayton, M.P., for West York, and acting premier at Ottawa during the absence of Mr. Meighen. "May they this time give something with it for Canada."

Sir Henry said the personal defeat of Mr. Meighen was particularly regrettable. His courage in sticking to his first constituency had been characteristic, though not appreciated. Quebec had remained solid he said, and this again was a regrettable feature. He thought the vote did not record the thought of Quebec on the real economic and fiscal questions before the country.

LUDENDORFF WEDS AGAIN.

Takes German Lady Doctor as His Second Bride.

Munich, Bavaria, Sept. 15.—Gen. Erich von Ludendorff, who was quartermaster-general of the German imperial army in the world war, was married at noon yesterday to Frau Dr. Mathilde von Komnitz.

The bride, who was mentioned by the former Frau von Ludendorff in divorce proceedings in July, is a specialist on nervous diseases. The marriage ceremony, which was strictly private, was performed by the local registrar at the bride's home at Tutzing, on Starnberg Lake. Ludendorff is sixty-one years old.
