LETTERS To The Editor Of The Whig. Re Short Weight. Sir: My attention has just been drawn to an article which was published in a late issue of your valuable paper, which read as follows:

I do not know where you obtained the above information, but I am confident that it was not from the Department of Trade and Commerce, and I am now writing to say that the above article does not go far enough, as any person caught giving short weight on any commodity becomes liable under the Act to Amend the Weights and Measures Act (1919) sec. 61A of chap. 75, which reads as follows:

of the provisions of the Criminal Code, any person who sells, delivers or causes to be sold or delivered, anything by weight, measure or number, short of this quantity ordered or purchased, shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars for the first offence, and to a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars for every subsequent offence.
