

"61A. Notwithstanding any of the provisions of the Griminal Code, any person who sells, delivers or causes to be sold or delivered, anything by weight measure or number, short of the quantity ordered or purchased shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars for the first offence, and to a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars for every subsequent offence. No oceedings shall be taken under the provisions of this section except with the consent
