**M'GILL WILL BE THE WEAK TEAM**

"Silver" Quilty Selected as Intercollegiate Umpire This Year.

Montreal, Sept. 16.—Joe O'Brien will be the senior referee in the Intercollegiate Rugby Football Union this season, according to a statement issued yesterday, the Montreal taking the position left vacant through the retirement of Bob Isbister, of Hamilton, who has officiated in the senior role for the past four years, during which time Joe O'Brien acted as umpire in the intercollegiate. It is practically certain that Silver Quilty, of Ottawa, will fill the umpire's berth this season in the college series, though official notification to this effect has not been made. It is understood, however, that all three universities have agreed to Quilty as umpire. The head linesman for the autumn series of games has not yet been named.

McGill University rugby players were called for the first drill of the season yesterday afternoon. Coach Frank Shaughnessy returned to the city yesterday morning and was at the stadium in the afternoon, but he had a comparatively light session ahead with a mere handful of players out. McGill footballers this fall are for the most part engaged in clearing off supplemental examinations and for the next few days will give little time to rugby practice. Others, such as Captain Gordie Hughes, are engaged in summer school work out of the city and will not be freed from the tours until the beginning of next week.

Included among last year's regulars who have academic qualifications to write off before they are eligible for football are Ralph St. Germain, kicking halfback; Curly Taylor, Gordie Hughes and Jack Little, Jack Mickles, quarterback for the past few seasons, is attending the U.S. amateur golf champion, from which he was eliminated in the qualifying round.

There is little new promising prep school material offering this fall and Coach Shaughnessy will have to rely largely on last year's intercollegiate to fill the gaps left vacant through graduations last spring. Carson, Dave Monroe, on the line, and Tommy Arnold on the half-line are three likely candidates from the 1925 second squad. From the 1925 juniors there will be O'Meara and Dalton, two hefty young line smashers.

**SOCCER LEAGUE MEETS.**

A meeting of those interested in soccer football is being held tonight at the Standard office for the purpose of organization for the season. It is expected that there will be about eight teams in the League this season comprising squads from the R.C.H.A. Brigade, three teams from R. M. C., Kingston, Tannery, C. L. C., "E" Co. of Frontenac Regiment, Nanapan, Sealey's Bay and Joyceville.

Just what brings the pair of football stars to this city is not quite clear, but it is stated that both are considering entering business in Montreal.

It is also understood that the pair are ready to turn out with the Montreal Big Four rugby squad. Their addition would be a welcome one to the Winged Wheel camp, which is not over-strong this season, but whether they can come within the residence rule of the Intercollegiate Rugby Football Union is another question.

**Murder and Manslaughter Cases To Be Heard at the Fall Assizes**

**Justice Logie to Sit Here Next Week—An Interesting Docket of Civil Non-Jury Cases.**

The following is the docket of criminal and civil cases for trial at the fall assizes of the Supreme Court of Ontario to be held for the County of Frontenac, at the City of Kingston, commencing on Tuesday, the 21st day of September, at one o'clock in the afternoon, before the Hon. Mr. Justice Logie.

**The King vs. Thomas McCoskey,** charged with the murder of Earl Jenkins, a guard at Portsmouth penitentiary on August 28th of this year.

**The King vs. Edward McAllister,** charged with manslaughter and negligence in the death of Ex-Aid. W. J. B. White on August 5th, 1926.

**Civil Actions—Non-Jury.**

**Anderson Bros. Ltd., plaintiff, and Corporation of the City of Kingston, defendant.** Plaintiff's claim is for damages caused by negligence of the defendant.
