Fear a Fresh Upheaval In the Army of Spain

Mutiny Spreading—Premier De Riviera Told King Alfonso He Would Proclaim Republic With Himself As President If He Yields to Officers' Demands.

London, Sept. 17.—A special correspondent of The Daily Express, who has been in Spain investigating the situation and the recent crisis due to the mutiny of artillery, telegraphs from Hendaye, a lurid picture of events. He asserts that the mutiny is growing in the army and that a fresh upheaval is expected.

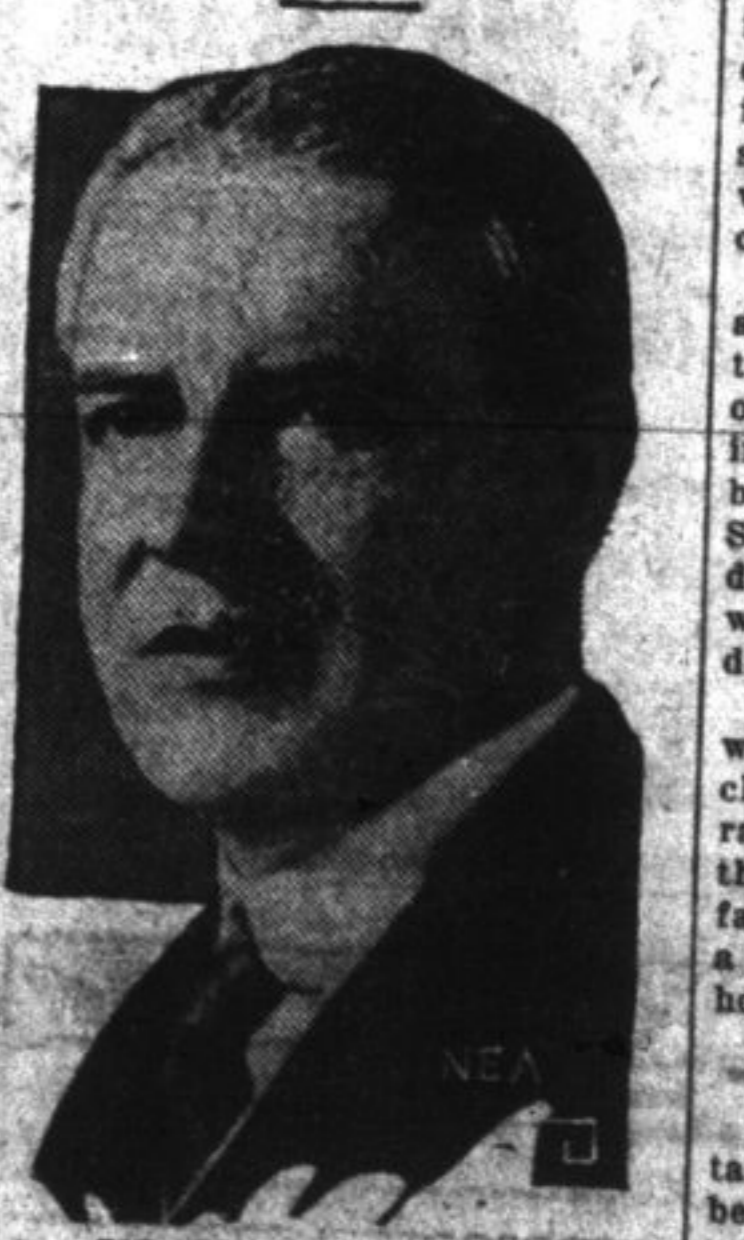
BLASTS OF WINTER IN THE FAR WEST

CHILD DROWNED IN TUB

Peterboro, Sept. 17.—Gerald Fraser, eighteen months old, was drowned last night in a tub of water at his parents' home. The little lad's sister, aged six, pulled him out almost immediately after he fell into the tub but life was extinct.

BRITISH RESCUE PARTY

London, Sept. 17.—A despatch to the Daily Express from Shanghai says that seventy foreign women and sixty children who had been isolated at Kikunshun, in the province of Honan, were rescued by British naval tug and have arrived in Hankow in a pitiful condition.

ONTARIO ELECTIONS EXPECTED NOV. 11TH

APPOINTED TO HAMBURG

Berlin, Sept. 17.—Captain James T. Scott, former commissioner for American relief administration in the Baltic states and for the past year and a half head of the Berlin office of the United States Lines, has been appointed American trade commissioner in Hamburg in succession to H. C. Squire, who is returning shortly to Washington.

SCARLET FEVER IN GERMANY

Berlin, Sept. 17.—Contaminated meat has caused 55 cases of paratyphoid in Duisberg, and the number of persons affected is expected to increase. Despatches said 1,600 persons are being treated for scarlet fever.

MORE PATIENTS LEAVING

Sixteen patients from Nowat Hospital are leaving to-night, between 5 and 9 o'clock, for St. Anne de Bellevue, Quebec.

AMERICAN BAND CAME

CAR LOAD OF SAWDUST
