## Athletic Meet On To-Morrow

The boys have profited by the instructions given them by the coaches and they have shown a great eagerness to get into the events and come through if possible. A great deal of time and money has been spent in promoting the sports throughout this district and tomorrow will see contestants here from this whole area.

The winners will be sent to Toronto to compete in the Ontario finals and their expenses will be paid. The trip to Toronto is not the only thing that the boys are anxious about but most of all, they wish to get the best results from the training they have received. There promises to be some splendid events tomorrow and a large crowd should turn out and encourage the boys in their work at the stadium in preparation for the Toronto final meet.

## KINGSTON DISTRICT FOOTBALL LEAGUE

The Kingston District Association Football League held their first general meeting Thursday night when the officers for the season were elected and installed and the constitution of the league with amendments adopted. It was expected that there would be representatives from several manufacturing teams of the city and from several out-of-town teams but there were only four local teams represented and communication had been sent from Nanapanes thus entering them in the League. The four Kingston teams are: R.M.C. cadets, R.M.C. physical training staff, R.C.A., Tannery.

The officers of the League as installed are: Hon. president, Mayor Thomas Angrove; hon. vice-presidents, Major-Gen. Emsley, Brig-Gen. Hill, Col. C. F. Constantine, Col. Elkins, Gen. A. E. Ross, A. N. Steady, W. R. Givens, W. Casey, W. Hart, H. Milne, H. Richardson, W. R. Davies; president, Capt. S. A. Lee; vice-president, I. C. Edwards; secretary-treasurer, B. A. Mellon. On the executive there will also be two representatives from each team.

The meeting, without very much discussion, agreed that it would be a good plan this year to have a ground man to look after the goal posts, flags and other pitch equipment, this man to be paid for each game.

The constitution of the Ontario Association was adopted for the League, the executive to add any necessary bye-laws or amendments. The collections from the games, with the exception of out-of-town games, will all be reverted to the League treasury.

The secretary was instructed to notify all officers by mail of their appointment.

The executive members, who were present, then went into a special session to make amendments to the constitution and to draw up the schedule for the coming season. The bye-laws and amendments drawn up were as follows:

- 1.—That captains of teams hand list of players on team to the referee before the game commences.
  - 2.—That in the event of a tie the referee will call fifteen minutes overtime each way to decide a winner and if after that time the score still is tied the game will be called a draw.
  - 3.—That all games will be played under Canadian Association Football rules.
  - 4.—That in the event of the time or place of a game being changed the secretary will notify the teams 24 hours before the time the game is scheduled.
  - 5.—That each club be responsible for line-men for each game.
  - 6.—That goal judges may be appointed at the discretion of the referee.
  - 7.—That all players must be registered with the secretary before each team's first game.
  - 8.—That no transfers be made without the sanction of the executive and only one transfer be allowed for each player for the season.
  - 9.—That no players will be eligible to play in a league game or cup unless residing within a fifty mile radius of Kingston for a period of 7 days.
  - 10.—That the first mentioned team on the schedule shall be the home team and shall be responsible for supplying the ball for the game.
- The first game will be played Saturday, Sept. 25th, when R.M.C. cadets will meet the R.M.C. P.T.

## Fred "Beano" Wright and Harvey Reist Have Joined With Tricolor Gridders

### Wright is a Former Rowing Club Player—Reist is a Senior Hockey Star as Well as Rugby Player—Joy at Queen's Over Prospects for This Season—Championship Hopes High.

A great stir was caused throughout the University yesterday afternoon when Harvey Reist and Fred "Beano" Wright, reported at the Queen's. These two prospects for the stocks of the Tricolor up a few notches and Queen's believe they have secured two outstanding players.

Fred "Beano" Wright is a half-line star who formerly played with the Hamilton Rowing Club in the O.R.F.U. series. He has more than a reputation and his advent into Queen's has aroused considerable interest in rugby circles.

Harvey Reist arrived yesterday afternoon from Galt and has started the grind with the rugby squad at the University. Reist formerly played with the Galt Collegiate team and was a star with the Galt intermediate team. He is looked upon as a bright prospect for the Queen's ball program. In addition to his football prowess, Reist is a hockey player of note, having played with Preston in senior hockey. He is also a 19 years of age.

There is jubilation at Queen's University, much different from the spirit at McGill to date. Queen's will have another powerful team this fall and judging from the material that has already been lined up, forty stalwart and husky football players, there is material enough to carry the team to the Dominion finals unless some very rash judgments have been made. ## THE PROBLEM OF ORGANIZED PLAY

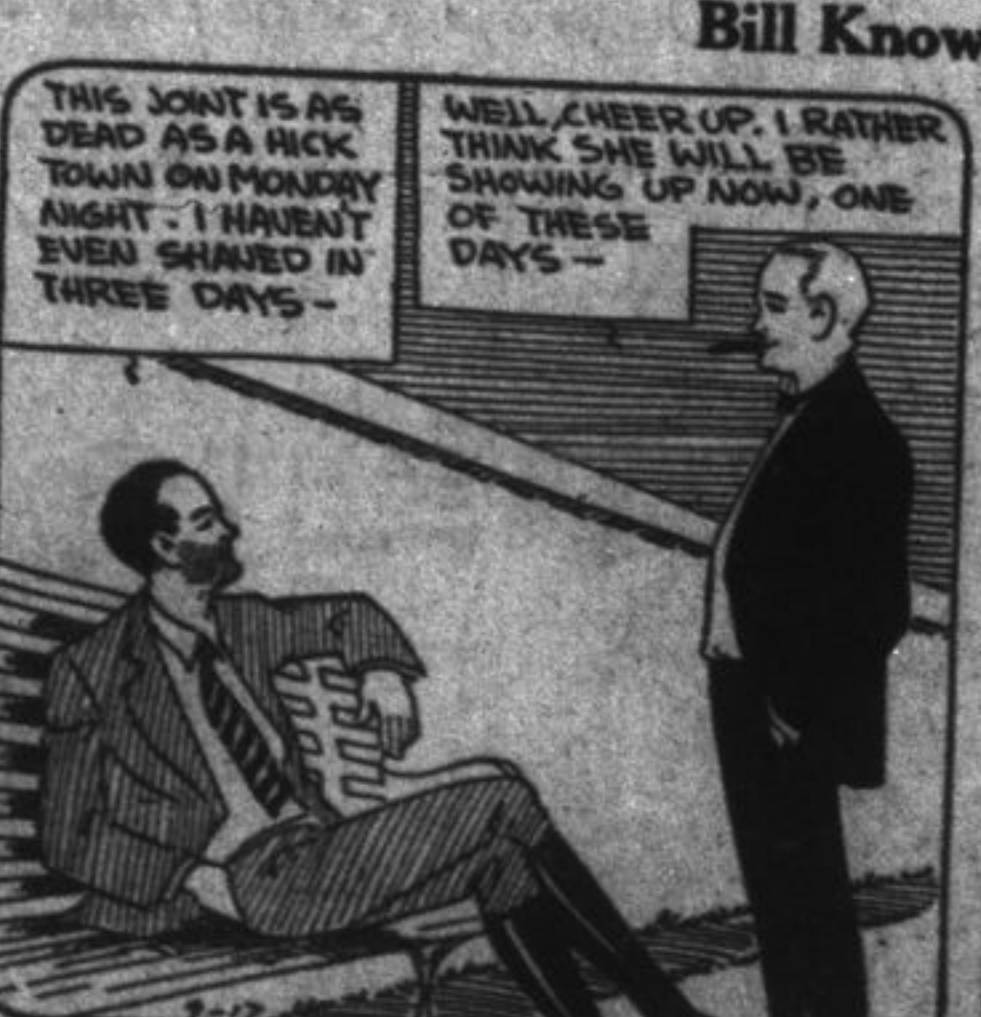
### W. P. Hughes Praises Work of Ontario Athletic Commission.

Mr. W. P. Hughes, Athletic Director of Queen's University, in addressing the Rotary Club on Thursday, declared that he believed the schools of Ontario, co-operating through the Department of Education with the Ontario Amateur Athletic Commission, were tackling the problem of organized supervised play more ably than in any other place on the continent.

In this connection he mentioned that the Commission held district meets in ten different parts of Ontario for school boys and then held a championship meet in Toronto for the winners from all over the province. The Kingston and District meet was to be held on Saturday at Queen's Stadium, he said. Mr. Hughes regretted that it was not possible because of lack of funds to have the girls compete and pay their expenses to Toronto but he looked forward to that in the future. The Commission spent \$17,000 on the meets last fall, he said, which showed to what extent the work was being done.
