THE PROBLEM OF ORGANIZED PLAY

W. P. Hughes Praises Work of Ontario Athletic Commission.

Mr. W. P. Hughes, Athletic Director of Queen's University, in addressing the Rotary Club on Thursday, declared that he believed the schools of Ontario, co-operating through the Department of Education with the Ontario Amateur Athletic Commission, were tackling the problem of organized supervised play more ably than in any other

place on the continent. In this connection he mentioned that the Commission held district meets in ten different parts of Ontario for school boys and then held a championship meet in Toronto for the winners from all over the province. The Kingston and District meet was to be held on Saturday at Queen's Stadium, he said. Mr. Hughes regretted that it was not possible because of lack of funds to have the girls compete and pay their expenses to Toronto but he looked forward to that in the future. The Commission spent \$17,000 on the meets last fall, he said, which showed to what extent the work was being done.
