

THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE AT GUELPH

Attendance Highest in Recent Years—President Explains New Position.

Guelph, Sept. 22.—Eighty students have enrolled in the freshman year at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, this fall. This is the largest attendance in recent years...

The first year at the O.A.C. is divided into two sections, one composed of those students taking the four-year degree course and the others those taking the two-year associate course.

While the attendance has shown a satisfactory gain in the past few years, it does not constitute a record by any means.

W. Y. MILLS ELECTED LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR

At Convention of Kiwanis of Ontario-Quebec District Held in Toronto.

At the convention of the Kiwanis of the Ontario-Quebec district, held in Toronto Tuesday, W. Y. Mills, of Kingston, was elected a lieutenant-governor for the central division.

The delegates went on record as favoring a dominion-wide recognition on July 1st, 1927, the jubilee year of confederation.

The Ontario-Quebec district will be divided into four divisions for future work, it being claimed that the movement has grown beyond the scope of three divisions.
