ONTARIO'S FAREWELL TO BYNG OF VIMY

Canada's Popular Governor-General Guest at Banquet in Toronto.

Toronto, Sept. 22.—Ontario bade farewell and god-speed last night to the retiring Governor-General of Canada, Baron Byng of Vimy, and Lady Byng.

In terms bespeaking the affection of all Canadians for the individual who has represented his Majesty the King in Canada during the last five years, Premier Ferguson, on behalf of the people of the Province, in the presence of a distinguished gathering at the King Edward Hotel, expressed his regret at the impending departure of their Excellencies. In his address he mentioned his Honor Col. Henry Cockburn, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, and Right Hon. Sir William Blitch, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Ontario, added their adieux to that of the Premier.

When the victor of Vimy rose to reply decorum was flung to the winds, and again and again the cheers of the brilliant assembly broke forth. "Lustily they sang 'For He's a Jolly Good Fellow,'" and the guest of honor was compelled to stand silent while the plaudits rose and died away. It was a striking mark of tribute and affection to the distinguished soldier and statesman.

Toronto's Farewell. Toronto, Sept. 22.—Toronto paid its final tribute to Baron and Lady Byng this morning when they were accompanied to the train for Ottawa by a guard of honor and several hundred citizens. They sail from Quebec for home on September 28th.

BARON BYNG UNVEILS TORONTO MEMORIAL

Tears in His Eyes as Governor-General Officiates at Ceremony.

Toronto, Sept. 22.—To the glory of God and to honor the memory of the fifty-nine members of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club who gave their lives in the great war, I now unveil this memorial," were the few simple words used by His Excellency Lord Byng when he pulled off the Union Jack from the stone capstan, surmounted by a bronze sun-dial on the front lawn of the club at the Island yesterday.

This was the first public appearance of the governor-general since before the election.

His excellency had been requested last night to say a few words at the unveiling, but he excused himself. At the city hall, also, he showed the deep emotion he feels at leaving Canada and the Canadians he led during the great war. Tears were in his eyes as he read the city's address to him in the mayor's reception room at the city hall. He did not try to conceal them. He took out his handkerchief and brushed them away.

She had been living in St. Catharines, but came to Kingston two months ago, in an endeavor to secure employment, as a domestic. However, she had answered several advertisements in the local newspapers, and had been unable to land a job. A friend had taken her in, and, while she had not been employed, she had helped out in work around the house.
