BARON BYNG UNVEILS TORONTO MEMORIAL

Tears in His Eyes as Governor-General Officiates at Ceremony.

> Toronto, Sept. 22 .- "To the glory of God and to honor the memory o the fifty-nine members of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club who gave their lives in the great war. I now unveil this memorial," were the few simple words used by His Excellency Lord Byng when he pulled off the Union Jack from the stone capstan, surmounted by a bronze sun-dial on the front lawn of the club at the Island yesterday.

This was the first public appearance of the governor-general since before the election.

His excellency had been requestd last night to say a few words a the unveiling, but he excused him self.
