B.C. REQUEST DENIED BY RAILWAY BOARD

Criminal Prosecution of Rail Officials Was Sought on Grain Rates.

Vancouver, Sept. 22.—British Columbia's application for right to begin criminal prosecutions of officers of the Canadian Pacific Railway and Canadian National Railways on a charge of failure to grant British Columbia full benefit of an equalization order on west-bound and east-bound grain rates, has been dismissed by the Board of Railway Commissioners.

Notification to this effect has been received by G. G. McGee, K.O., freight rates counsel for British Columbia, in a letter dated September 15th, and signed by A. D. Cartwright secretary of the commission.

Hon. Frank Oliver, Edmonton, dissented from the views of his colleagues on the board, and favored giving British Columbia authority to proceed with criminal court action.

London, Sept. 22.—The Prince of Wales attended last night's performance of "Black Birds," a negro review featuring Florence Mills.

PRESENCE OF CANADA NEEDED AT CONFERENCE

Imperial Gathering Would Be Farcical Without the New Premier.

London, Sept. 22.—While any further postponement of the Imperial conference to be made in the interest of Canada is considered unlikely in Government circles, no definite decision can be made until the Australian, New Zealand and South African Premiers, now on their way here, arrive, or before the Hon. Mackenzie King is sworn in or makes a request for postponement.

The Government is most anxious that Canada should be fully represented and will do everything possible to accommodate Mackenzie King's wishes. It is pointed out, however, that it will be for the other

Premiers to decide whether they are prepared to kick their heels in London in the meantime. It is recalled that Premier Bruce of Australia declared he would not attend the conference unless Canada had a representative there and in Australian circles here it is suggested that there is a possibility of the conference being opened on October 19th and then adjourned to allow Canada to be represented by Mr. King, providing there is a definite date on which Mr. King will be able to come.

It is recognized that the conference would be farcical without Canadian representation and undoubtedly the greatest pressure will be exerted to secure adequate representation from the new Canadian Government. Government circles here refuse to believe the statement attributed to Mr. King, that Canada would not be represented at the conference.
