is bound to be lost, and the extent will depend on the weather from now on." He regarded the recent cooler weather and snowfalls as preferable to the warm rainy weather of a few weeks ago.

"With the exception of a small district in the southeast of the province that in the opinion of many should never have been taken away from the ranchers, Alberta this year has a uniformly good crop. Lethbridge district hopes to harvest considerably more wheat than a year ago.

NO GROUNDS FOR DAMAGES POSSIBLE

If You Are a Volunteer Occupant of Car in Accident.

Toronto, Sept. 24.—A jury in County Court yesterday maintained the principle that if a person voluntarily enters a private vehicle and an accident occurs there are no grounds for damages for injuries suffered. This verdict was returned by the jury in the case of Frank Foley and Henry Eakin, versus Mary J. Reed as administratrix of the estate of her son, Thomas Reed. The plaintiffs sued for \$5,000 for injuries sustained, according to their evidence, when an automobile driven by Thomas Reed, in which the plaintiffs were guests, collided with a street car here recently. Reed was killed in the crash.

Judge O'Connell quoted a recent amendment to the Motor Vehicles Act in which it is laid down that the burden of proving negligence rests with the plaintiff. It was argued by C. Thompson, for the plaintiffs, that the amendment was not in existence at the time of the accident and was not retroactive, but he was overruled. The jury found there was no negligence on the part of Reed.

Crop Conditions. The crops of the dominion as a whole are well up to the average, but in the determination of their ultimate value the weather is now a vital factor. In the Prairie Provinces, for the past two weeks, rain and snow have further delayed threshing operations. As a consequence, Manitoba and Alberta report much damage from sprouting. Conditions in Saskatchewan are somewhat better. In both Quebec and Ontario harvesting operations have been retarded by rain. In the Maritime Provinces weather conditions generally have been good. In British Columbia, where the harvesting of cereals is completed, some benefit to later crops has resulted from recent rains.

ONTARIO GOLD OUTPUT

Eight Months' Increase \$620,877 Compared With 1925. Toronto, Sept. 24.—During the first eight months of 1926, the output of Ontario gold mines was \$29,579,399, compared with \$19,958,522 in the same period of 1925, an increased production of \$9,620,877 being noted. There was a slight decrease in production in August, 1926, as compared with August, 1925, the value last month being \$2,670,150, as compared with \$2,701,204 in the corresponding month of 1925, although the number of tons of ore milled was greater this year.

Wycliffe Convocation. Toronto, Sept. 24.—At Wycliffe College convocation, which will be held here on October 7th, the special speakers will be: Bishop Hamilton, of Japan, and Rev. Colin Kerr, vicar of the parish of Spitalfields, London, England, who will speak on the relation of the Church to the masses. Rev. Dr. Dymon Hague, Church of the Epiphany, Toronto, has been elected president of the Wycliffe College Alumni Association for the ensuing year.

WIDOW WAS EASY ESCAPE. Wanted to Escape From Farm, Declared the Judge. Toronto, Sept. 24.—"This woman seemed ready to do anything to escape from farm life, and was an easy victim," Mr. Justice Middleton stated yesterday, in writing an opinion concurring with other judges in dismissing the appeal of H. H. Neely and W. M. Sanderson, Toronto, real estate agents, from judgment against them in favor of Mrs. Elizabeth Leeson, widow, Norfolk county, Ont., for \$5,500. Mr. Justice Middleton added that there was evidence of unloading a Toronto apartment house on the plaintiff at a gross valuation in exchange for her farm.

Miss Macphall Hopeful. Durham, Ont., Sept. 24.—Miss Agnes Macphall, re-elected for Gray Southeast, after the cheers and horn-blowing were over, said to her admirers speaking from a balcony: "I have greater self-confidence, owing to the confidence you have reposed in me, and I am sure I will be able to serve you better in the Parliament that is ahead than I did in the one just past." Practically all of the day she spent at her father's house in Cayton. She received returns by telephone. In her home poll at Cayton, No. 4, Miss Macphall lost heavily. In this poll last year her majority was 92. Now there was a loss of 56. "I expected it," said Miss Macphall. "The turnout of old people, some of whom had not been in a booth for 15 years, may have been responsible for this."

Echo of Home Bank. Toronto, Sept. 24.—An echo of the Home Bank crash was heard in the Second Divisional Court here when Mary E. Campbell, of London, appealed from the finding of Mr. Justice Mowat with regard to the payment of a mortgage with a Home Bank cheque on the day the bank closed its doors. Judge Mowat held that this payment, which was made to the woman by Jack and Louis Ray now, also of London, constituted a valid discharge of the indebtedness of the mortgage. The Second Divisional Court reserved judgment to-day.

SENATE UNDER FIRE AT LABOR CONGRESS

Miss Mary MacNab Would Go to Ottawa and Turn Old Boys Out.

Montreal, Sept. 24.—Denunciation of the Canadian Senate as the body which ever stands in the way of the realization of Labor's legislative hopes, was a feature of yesterday's annual session of the Dominion Trades Congress now being held here, the incoming executive was instructed to do all in its power either towards the abolition of the Senate or its reform. "A worn-out tool" reminiscent of the days of ox wagons in Canada, was the description applied to the Senate by Miss Mary MacNab, of Toronto, organizer of the Textile Workers. "Aged in mind and in body," was another description by the same speaker. When she thought of all the social advancement legislation which the Senate had defeated she felt tempted to go to Ottawa and turn them out herself. The report on minimum wages for men and women was carried. The recommendation is that the Executive of the Congress work for such legislation.

MAGISTRATE WOULD HANG BOOTLEGGERS

Man Fined \$1,000 and Costs by the Court at North Bay.

North Bay, Sept. 24.—Michael Matte, of Montreal, was convicted on a charge of keeping intoxicating liquors for purposes of sale, by Magistrate S. Weegar and in consequence fined \$1,000, and costs along with one month in prison or in default of payment, an additional six months. He will serve the next seven months in jail if he doesn't pay. All the liquor was ordered confiscated. In passing sentence His Worship designated the most contemptible brute in human form as the bootlegger. The magistrate felt that the law was not stiff enough, it should be "ten years or hanging."

To Protest Election Of Dr. M. J. Maloney

Renfrew, Sept. 24.—The election of Dr. M. J. Maloney, Conservative, for South Renfrew, is to be protested, it was stated in authoritative circles here today. Whether the protest will be made by the Liberal or Progressive candidate is not known, but it is said that in any event action will be taken to unseat the winner in the contest.
