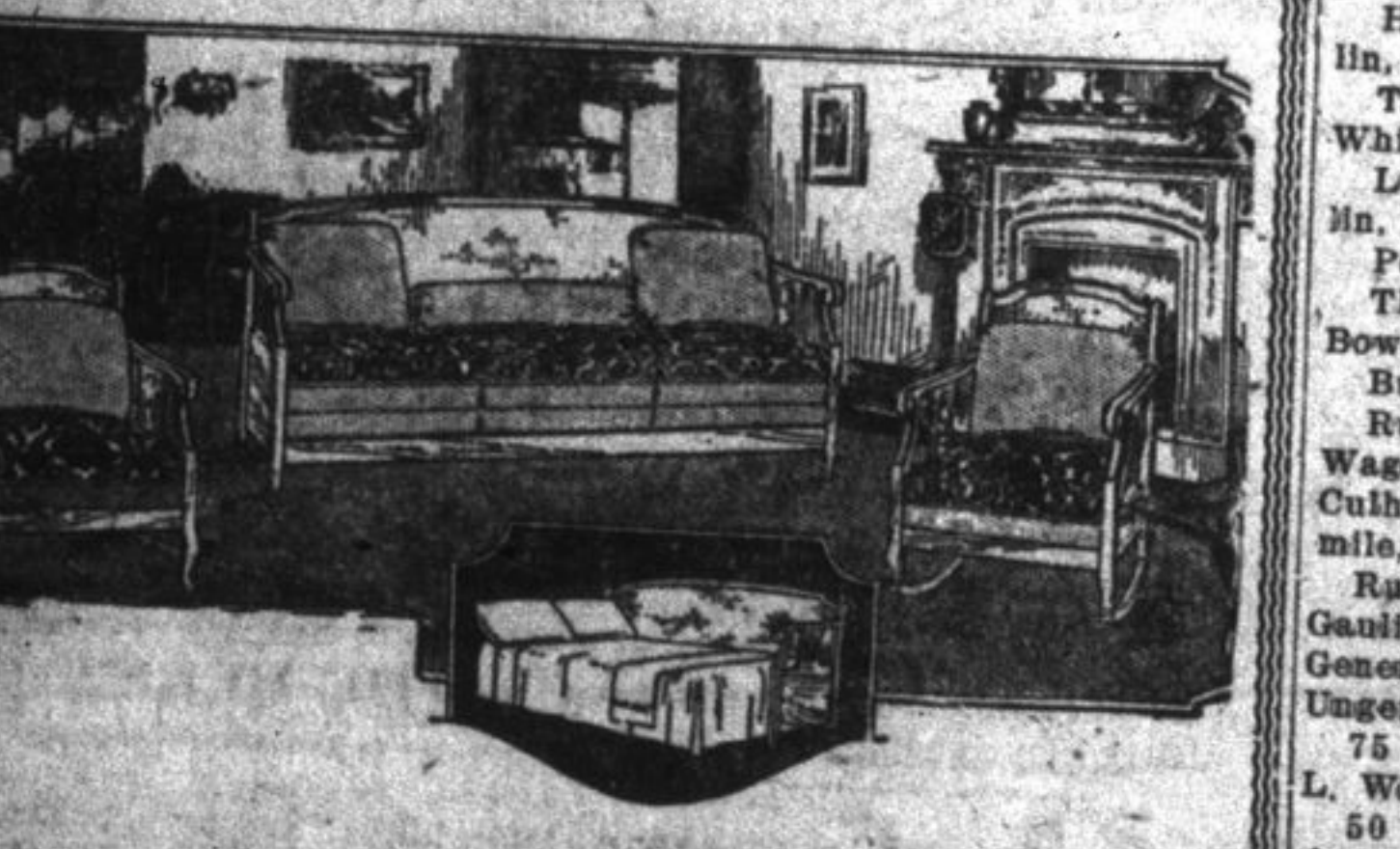

Highway Conditions

Relay weather and frost are the greatest enemies that the Provincial Highways have to withstand during the Winter and early Spring. In order to keep the roads in the best repair extensive patching of macadam, filling cracks in concrete pavements and graveling, will be carried on from now until freeze up.

This class of work gives employment to numerous gangs of men and teams in the rural sections. With more teams and men on the road motorists are requested to watch for these gangs and give them a chance.

Trans-Provincial Highway from Windsor to Quebec Boundary—544.5. Where direct connections are made with the Quebec Highway No. 27 to Montreal. This road passes via Chatham, London, Woodstock, Brantford, Hamilton and along the north shore of Lake Ontario to Toronto, Oshawa, Cobourg, Belleville, Kingston, continuing on one of the province's most scenic routes in Southern Ontario, namely the north shore of the St. Lawrence River through Brockville, Prescott and Cornwall, 470 miles of this route is paved.

Toronto to Quebec Boundary—300.3 miles—Six detours. (No detour ever six miles long). Newcastle, one mile east of Grafton, 1-4 miles west of Brighton, West of Kingston, Lansdowne and west of Brockville. Pavement good, gravel sections fair throughout. Between Kingston and Quebec Boundary short sections of the Highway is being constructed under traffic. Will be rough on account of loose stone.

Pavement good from Toronto to five miles east of Cobourg, except between Newcastle and Port Hope. East of Newcastle the road is under construction. Turn south at Newcastle one mile, thence easterly 1-2 miles and northerly one mile to Highway. Length of detour five miles—two miles longer than the Provincial Highway. Road is gravelled throughout but narrow. One railway crossing on detour. From five miles east of Cobourg to Brighton gravel road is under construction. Detour south at a point 1-2 mile west of Grafton, 1-4 of a mile to the old Canadian National Railway roadbed; thence easterly to 1-2 miles and north 1-4 of a mile to highway. In wet weather the detour will be changed to the Lake Shore Road—after proceeding 1-3 miles along railway roadbed turn south and follow signs into Brighton. Drive carefully at night as on detour some sections are narrow. Detour south 1-4 miles west of Brighton for 1-3 miles; thence easterly 1-2 miles and north to town of Brighton. Detour fair in all weather condition. On sections of pavement that have been opened between Brighton and Trenton the road has not been shouldered. Motorists should drive cautiously and

carefully. Trenton to Quebec Boundary pavement and surface-treated macadam in good condition throughout except where construction work is going on and short sections may be rough. Penetration macadam construction proceeding west of Kingston, Gananoque, Lansdowne, Brockville, Cardinal, Morrisburg and east of Cornwall. Detours at Kingston, Lansdowne and west of Brockville. Traffic may be delayed for fifteen minutes on some sections where construction work is proceeding.

Quebec Boundary to Montreal—Quebec Highway No. 27—55.11 miles—Good from Boundary to St. Zotique. Resurfacing under way between St. Zotique and Coteau Landing. Drive slowly. Good from here to Montreal except Point Claire and Beaufield, where resurfacing is under way—this work does not affect traffic. Motorists should dim lights at night along the Soulanges Canal.

Kingston to Ottawa via Rideau Lakes—Through Perth, Smith's Falls and Carleton Place—131 miles—Fair condition throughout except where grading construction is in progress north of Joyceville and west of Portland, no detours.

Surface-treated macadam road from Kingston to Joyceville continued by a gravel road to Smith's Falls. Grading is proceeding north of Joyceville and west of Portland and short sections of the road are very rough and muddy due to recent rains. No detours. From Smith's Falls to Ashton Post Office the surface-treated macadam road is in fair condition. Ashton to Stittsville the gravel road is in good shape and is continued from this point to Ottawa by an asphalt pavement.

Ottawa to Prescott 82.3 miles—Good throughout—No detours. Asphalt and concrete pavement to North Gower. From North Gower to Beckett's Landing road is under construction—no detour—drive slowly in this section. The road consisting of concrete and gravel from Beckett's Landing to Prescott is good.
