LOOKING FOR RECORD IN DEER HUNTING

And It is Reported That They Are More Numerous Than for Some Time.

Officials of the Department of Game and Fisheries anticipate that this year will be a record in the number of licenses issued for deer and moose, and the fact that deer are more numerous than they have been for some time is expected to be an added incentive to the hunters.

Season for hunting deer, moose, caribou and caribou in Ontario is as follows: "South of the French and Mattawa Rivers, Nov. 5th to Nov. 20th inclusive; north of the French and Mattawa Rivers, to main line of the Canadian Government Railway, Oct. 25th to Nov. 30th, inclusive; north of the Canadian Government Railway, Sept. 15th to Nov. 15th, inclusive."

There is no close season on bear, fox, rabbit, weasel, lynx and skunk. Season for duck, wild geese, plover and snipe is now under way, opening on Sept. 1st to Dec. 15th, inclusive. A bag of 25 duck per day is allowed, with a maximum of 200 for the season.

Deer licenses for residents of Ontario cost \$3.50 plus 50c. issuance fee. Resident licenses for moose are \$5.50 plus an issuance fee of 50c. Non-resident big game licenses cost \$41, and include the privilege of taking one deer, one moose or caribou, as well as bear, on which there is no protection.

Deer seasons in Ontario remain the same as those of former years, with the exception of St. Joseph's Island in the District of Algoma, where the season has been shortened, it being Nov. 15th to 30th. Change was made at the request of residents who felt that the former period interfered with their farm work.

GYPSIES ROUNDED UP NEAR QUEBEC

A band of gypsies has been rounded up near the city of Quebec, charged with the theft of \$1,000 from a branch of the Royal Bank, and it is believed that they are the same gypsies who visited the Seeley's Bay branch of the Bank of Toronto last summer, and stole in the neighborhood of \$200, which was recovered after the members of the band had been locked up at Brockville.

Shortly after the robbery was reported at Seeley's Bay, a man who claimed that his home was near Watertown, N.Y., visited the manager of the Seeley's Bay bank and stated that he had been robbed of a large sum of money by two gypsy women, who claimed that they were going to sell his fortune. The story which the man told is similar to that told in the court at Quebec. This Watertown man reported the theft of the American police authorities, who have been on the lookout for the gypsies. It is expected that the gypsies will be turned over to the American police after the Canadian authorities deal with them.

INJURED MAN'S WIFE LIVED IN KINGSTON

Mrs. Vernon Knowles' Husband Hurt by the Hurricane at Miami.

Miami, Fla., Sept. 25.—Rehabilitation took renewed impetus through Florida's hurricane-stricken area today, a week after the devastating storm with fears of famine, pestilence and riots allayed. A check up of Canadians affected by the storm, conducted by the Canadian press by Vernon Knowles, former Winnipeg newspaper man, indicates that only two—an unidentified man and Danis Fla., and Mr. Knowles himself—received injuries. Mr. Knowles sustained injuries to his foot and received anti-tetanus treatment. Mrs. Knowles, formerly of Kingston, Ont., and two daughters escaped injury, but their home was damaged by falling trees.

An optimistic spirit prevailed in the stricken zone today. Stores and business houses have opened to dispose of depleted stocks and partially ruined merchandise.

The Kiwanians will leave in cars and at the outskirts of Gananoque the Kingston contingent will be met by a delegation of the Gananoque Canadian Club and will be escorted through the town and all the noise-making devices will be pressed into service to proclaim the arrival of Kiwanis in Gananoque.

The speaker at this joint meeting of the Canadian Club and Kiwanis Club will be the newly-elected Lt.-Governor W. Y. Mills, who will deliver an address on "The Aims and Ideals of Kiwanis." The booster will be Kiwanian Sherman Albertson, manager of the Kingston Branch of the Coca Cola Company.
