**DISCOVERS SKULL OF APE-LIKE CREATURE**

An Important Prehistoric Find is Made in Central Java.  
London, Sept. 28.—British anthropologists were thrilled today by a despatch from Batavia, Java, which said that Prof. Heberlein of the Netherlands Government Medical Service has discovered at Trinil, in Central Java the complete skull of a prehistoric ape-like creature termed by some the "missing link" and by science pithecanthropus erectus. Miss Mildred Tildesley, who has catalogued more than 5,000 skulls at the Royal College of Surgeons, believes that if the reported discovery is true, it is the most important of many years, as complete skulls of prehistoric human beings are exceedingly rare.

Young Twirler Pitched Fourth No-Hit No-Run Game at Guelph.  
Guelph, Sept. 25.—Pitching for the local Bantams in the first of a two-game series in the Ontario Baseball Amateur Association final against Ottawa Bantams, Jack Hanson, yesterday afternoon twisted in brilliant fashion to turn the visitors back without a hit or run, Guelph winning the game by a score of 5 to 0. Hanson, who has three previous no-hit games to his credit, was in remarkable form, striking out twenty batters, only allowing one drive out of the infield, a long fly to centre in the ninth, which was an easy out.

**BATSTONE TO BE DIRECTOR HERE?**  
Toronto Star Report Declares He Will Succeed Bill Hughes.  
Lou Marsh in the Toronto Star says: The latest rumor from Queen's—Billy Hughes of Montreal is to resign from his position as coach of Queen's rugby teams at the end of this season, to be succeeded by Harry Batstone of Toronto, who is to become director of athletics.  
Digest that one.  
It comes from a Queen's man of prominence.  
There is one thing—"Red" Batstone is one of the most popular athletes Queen's ever harbored—and he is just as popular generally around Kingston as he is around the college campus.  
**Misunderstanding in Rules Interpretation**  
Montreal, Sept. 28.—Difficulties have arisen in the Intercollegiate Rugby Union over the question of the interpretation of the interference rule and it is understood that a request has been made to have the rules committee meet referees, umpires, coaches and leaders of the clubs in the Union that uniform interpretation may be reached before the season becomes too far advanced and the teams coached in systems which may be judged illegal in the scheduled games. What the Intercollegiate has taken up will, almost of necessity have to be settled by the Canadian Rugby Union, as all unions this year are playing under the C. R. U. code.  
The difficulty has arisen over a question of interpretation of the three-yard interference rule. Referee Joe O'Brien has intimated that his idea of the rule, based purely on the black and white definition and not on what ought or ought not to be, is that interference shall only be allowed in a zone from the line of scrimmage three yards forward and from touchline to touchline. According to the rule the offensive side cannot interfere behind its own line of scrimmage. McGill footballers point out that the same rule has been in force for three years and that interference has been allowed behind the line. Further, they hold that it is only common sense that it be allowed on the defensive team on each play could force the offending side to illegal interference and thus turn the game into a series of penalties for the offences or reduce it to purely punting.  
As the Intercollegiate Union opens with the McGill-Varsity reunion game at the stadium here one week from Saturday, quick action is expected on the interpretation to be placed on an apparently badly-worded paragraph in the code.

Accompanying him was Loyal Laishley, rugby young backfield player and basketball, who should prove a useful addition to the none too large list of backs sporting the Red and White. Laishley has starred as a quarter for the Bismarck of Ottawa. Yesterday he showed fair halfback ability and a neat kick. His basketball training leaves him a perfect ball-handler.  
Conoh Shaughnessy is conditioning his squad and yesterday gave them a short but hard scrimmage drill as part of the practice schedule. Several of the players, particularly the bigger line men, are badly in need of the toughening up process.
