OBITUARY

John Murray.

On Sunday, Kingston lost one of her oldest, and most respected citizens, and the Presbyterian Church one of her most loyal sons, in the passing of Mr. John Murray, 146 Bay street, in his eighty-eighth year. Born of Scottish parents, at Wilton Dean, Scotland, he came to Canada when only six years of age, and lived for a number of years in Smith's Falls, where he went to school, and afterwards learned the trade of tanner. After marriage, he moved to Lindsay, where he was ordained an elder of the Presbyterian Church.

In the early eighties, he moved with his family to Kingston, and became connected with Cooke's church, and where for nearly forty years, he was an honored member of session, holding the office of ruling elder, and being very diligent in his attendance at the church courts. He was possessed of an exceptionally keen mind, being well informed on all the laws of the courts of his church. Since June of last year, he had been a member of St. Andrew's Church. He leaves to mourn his loss, three daughters, Mrs. William McCune, Misses Elizabeth, and Jennie; this city; two sons, George D of the Postal Service, Toronto, and Alexander J. merchant of Toronto; two sisters, Mrs. John Gemmill, Almonte, and Miss Margaret Murray, Bowesmount, North Dakota.

The funeral took place this afternoon, from his late residence. Rev. J. W. Stephen, of St. Andrew's Church officiated, and in the course of his remarks, eulogized the exemplary life and fine Christian endowments of the deceased. The bearers were William Anderson, Joseph Newman, Hugh McRatney, James McCulla, Charles Bowen and D. A. Shaw.

At her home, 27 William street west, shortly after midnight on Monday, Mrs. M. H. Claxton, passed quietly away after a very brief illness.
