German Women Gamblers. Berlin—"Lady Luck" is being chased at such a pace by German women that state lottery officials contemplate increasing the number of tickets sold from 700,000 to 1,000,000 in each of the semi-annual lotteries. Women make up approximately 60 per cent. of the 5,000,000 persons in Prussia, Bavaria, Baden and Wurttemberg who buy whole or fractions of tickets. In many cases officials said, the greater gambling instinct in women is responsible for husbands' and sweethearts' taking chances on winning up to \$100,000 on a whole ticket that sells for \$20. The gambling fever has increased 100 per cent since the war, principally among women. The four states net about \$8,000,000 annually out of the scramble from a 20 per cent. tax on all winnings.
