

Queen's Are Too Much For Senators--Tigers Defeated M.A.A.A.

QUEEN'S TRIUMPH OVER DOMINION CHAMPIONS IN EXHIBITION GAME HERE SATURDAY BY 7-3

Local Collegians Outplayed Ottawa Senators, Who Put up Hard Fight for Victory—Plenty of Excitement With Scraps Thrown In—Tubman and Voss Vied With Each Other for Kicking Honors—Chantler Gave Great Field Running Display—Tricolor Tacklers in Rare Form.

Queen's University seniors, inter-collegiate champions defeated the Ottawa Senators, Dominion champions, 7-3 in an exhibition game at the George Richardson Memorial Stadium on Saturday afternoon before a crowd of about 4,000 spectators.

They could pick opportunities and make the most of them. Voss did the kicking for Queen's and did it well. Chantler took another avenue to the fore. He excelled in broken field running and his dodging and fake passing completely baffled the opposition. Chantler, in the first quarter, shortly after play had started, made a valiant effort to clear from behind the line where he had taken Tubman's long punt.

down for a single point without trying to see whether anything could be done through the line or not. Ottawa 1, Queen's 0. Chantler uncorked the first bright piece of the day when he took Tubman's kick behind his own line but dodged and squirmed his way out. Queen's were the first to make yards through the line and Voss booted to Miller who made a beautiful return on the run. Miller dropped the ball but on Voss' kick made a lucky recovery.

The Queen's team made a remarkably fine showing and Coach Bill Hughes can be justly proud of the way his men handled themselves against the Dominion champions. He has boys who are willing and hard workers and there is every reason to believe that they will carry high the traditions established by their predecessors in 1922, 1923, 1924 and 1925.

Howard Was Great. Cliff Howard, making his local debut as a middle wing, scored a triumph and stepped into the full glare of the limelight by his work. Smashing, plunging and hurling, he repeatedly broke the Ottawa line. Head down, with the hole picked, or trying to make one himself, he slammed into the Ottawa line and time and again battered away with good results.

Voss took Miller's punt and made a clean break for 25 yards before he was tackled. He passed to Howard, who went 5 more but the pass was called forward and Ottawa secured. Miller hoofing on the first down. Voss ripped off another 25 yard run down the side of the field, dodging several tacklers on the way. Howard hit the line for 8 yards and Baldwin finished the distance. Voss recovered Ottawa's inside and booted on the first down to Miller behind the line but the Queen's wings missed him and he got safely out.

Not long after play was resumed Chantler broke on a 20-yard trip. "Beano" Wright kicked into touch behind the Ottawa line for a single. Ottawa 2, Queen's 1. Ottawa resorted to line plunging with good effect. Emmerson made yards on two trips at the line. Miller's kick went to Wright and Queen's used a fake kick, Chantler getting 7 yards. Wright kicked to Murnoney at centre. Emmerson and Connell made yards between them. An exchange between Wright and Miller gave Ottawa the ball at centre. Wright dropped Miller's kick at his own 20-yard line but recovered. Ottawa were trying Queen's centre and gained yards again on a plunge by Connell. Wright kicked away and in the break McKelvey's boot caught Murnoney on the side of the face, cutting it quite badly and stunning him for the moment. McKelvey came back to Murnoney and Murnoney made a straight arm jab at him and there was the makings of a scrap but cooler heads saved the situation.

Briseois relieved Murnoney. Voss returned Miller's kick to Ottawa's 4-yard line and the ball rolled. Queen's held Ottawa on plunges. On an exchange Voss kicked into touch at Ottawa's 35-yard line. An exchange gave Queen's an opening and Voss broke for 20 yards on a fake passing stunt. Voss' kick was blocked and he recovered the ball. Britton tried a field goal but it was not allowed and Queen's got only one point out of the effort. Queen's 2, Ottawa 2.

Tubman dropped Chantler's return and passed to Miller, who was downed at his own 35-yard line. Voss received Tubman's kick and cross-crossed with Chantler, the latter made a clean break for 15 yards. Monohan and Howard plunged 8 yards. Queen's lost the ball on a plunge and Voss fumbled Tubman's kick but recovered. Howard and Britton gained yards. Tubman ran back Voss' kick 10 yards. McMillan made a short gain and Tubman kicked to Chantler, who was downed behind the line. Ottawa 3, Queen's 2.

Don Young was chased again for holding. Queen's got possession. Chantler gained yards in the centre. Voss kicked and Miller broke on a clean 20-yard casker before he was brought down by Baldwin on a nice tackle. Tubman's kick went to Chantler and he tore down the side for a 40-yard run, dodging several tacklers on his way. Chantler broke

again right after that, on a 35-yard break. Voss tried a drop from 40 yards, was short. Miller tried to kick on the run but the ball went into touch at Ottawa's 45-yard line. Chantler and Voss gained 15 yards around Ottawa's left. Voss tried a drop and Tubman made a clever run, kicking 10 yards out. Tubman kicked on the first down. Voss returned the kick on the run. Wright replaced Chantler. He took a pass from Voss for a nice gain. Wright kicked on the first down to Tubman, who took the ball on the line and just got out. Tubman was given the ball and made one of the most exciting plays of the day. He made a clean break around Queen's right and before "Snag" Skelton had put a stop to the advance, Ottawa had netted a gain of over 70 yards. Voss went to the bench for charging. Tubman kicked on the first down and the ball went to Wright, who made a desperate effort and just got out.

Ottawa held attempts by Queen's to break their line. Miller took Voss' kick, Young making a great tackle. Queen's were fighting uphill. Tubman's kick went to McKelvey who made a neat run before he was tackled. Voss kicked to Tubman and the latter was promptly nailed at the goal line. Tubman tried to skirt; the Queen's right end but was brought down behind the line for a safety. Queen's 4, Ottawa 3.

Don Young drew his third trip to the penalty bench. Handford made a hard try at the line and on the next down Chantler faked a kick and made yards through Ottawa's left. Voss tried a field goal but the ball struck the goal post. Tubman again tried to skirt the end and was nailed by "Liz" Walker behind the line for another safety. Queen's 6, Ottawa 3.

Voss pulled a pretty bit of work when he took Tubman's kick on the run and got away from three would-be tacklers right in front of him. He ran the ball back 10 yards. He kicked to Tubman behind the line and Jimmy Wright floated Tubman. Queen's 7, Ottawa 3.

Emmerson gained yards for Ottawa through Queen's centre and nearly lost the ball in the attempt. Miller kicked to Voss and the latter returned it to Ottawa's 25-yard line on the run. Connell plunged for yards. Chantler ran back Miller's kick 7 yards. Ottawa were fighting hard when the final whistle sounded. Queen's 7, Ottawa 3.

TIGERS SQUEEZED THROUGH TO WIN

Outscored Montreal Winged Wheelers at Montreal by 12-10 Margin.

Montreal, Oct. 4.—The Montreal representatives in the inter-provincial rugby race got away on the wrong foot here Saturday afternoon when they bowed to the Hamilton Tigers by a 12-10 score after a game in which the team with the strongest kicking were always masters of the situation.

The Wheelers staged a great last rally to come within two points of the Tigers score but were not able to overcome the lead secured by the Hamiltonians. Only twice did either team make yards by scrimmage and the Tigers were the team to do that both times. It was a game of kicking first, last and always.

The westerly wind was the main factor in the scoring, the team with the breeze behind it back always holding the play in their opponents' territory. Bert Gibb gave a great exhibition of the use of the toe and kicked every point of the Tigers. To cap his performance, in the third quarter he placed a beautiful drop between the posts.

Montreal's best chance came just five minutes before the final bell when Langway fumbled practically on his own line and Montreal secured one yard out. Ralph Harrison, who played consistently at quarter in his first senior appearance in a scheduled game, went over for a touch alone on the first down. This brought the score to 12-10, but the Tigers held it to the finish. Around 5,000 witnessed the game.

It was announced previous to the start of the battle that Bud Thomas would get into the game with Montreal in the second quarter while Pop Leadley, another former Queen's star, was with the Tigers, but was not on the line-up that appeared on the field.

Frankie McKelvey, regular quarter of the Tigers, was not with the team, and Vesla was started at the pivot position. YANKS BEGAN WELL. Took Opening World's Series Game From St. Louis Saturday 2-1. Yankee Stadium, New York, Oct. 4.—Babe Ruth and Buster Gehrig the two big guns of the New York Yanks, put the American League champion out in front, before 60,000 spectators here Saturday afternoon when the Yanks defeated St. Louis Cardinals by a score of 2 to 1, in the first game of the world's series.

The pitchers then steadied, and the Yankee attack, which had been very dormant, broke out with just a fluster in the sixth inning, when Babe Ruth and Buster Gehrig put over the run that won the game.
