Rogers Hornsby, after mentioning Arthur Reinhart as a possibility every day, finally decided upon Rhem. Both are right handers.

Rhem was given the preference over Arthur Reinhart, southpaw, after making an appeal for a chance to tame the New Yorkers. "I am sure I can lick these fellows if I get a chance," Rhem told Manager Hornsby.

"THE BLACK PIRATE"

Douglas Fairbanks certainly may be said to have made the best of the glamorous, stirring story of "The Black Pirate" which he introduced to his eager, fawning, "The Black Pirate" sails suspensefully along in the traditional romantic course of the favored and vivid tales of fighting buccaners and buried treasure. The action, while its star is about, runs swiftly and he is emphatically about, all the time, he becomes, practically, captain of a pirate crew, along toward the end, in case you haven't guessed it—he rescues the fair lady after some spectacular underwater swimming, attended by cohorts of deep sea swimmers. Mr. Fairbanks, as a matter of fact, seems in excellent form, and what, after all, could be more suited to his talents than a ship literally loaded down with pirates on mischief bent; and a fair lady to be rescued after startling encounters?

Sea pictures always manage to appear picturesquely, but added to that, "The Black Pirate" is splendidly done from a pictorial point of view. Made entirely in subdued colorings, soothing to the eye, and a relief from the prevailing black and white, the entire film is a series of exquisitely lovely pictures. Technical or is the process used, and the innovation is, to our mind, notably successful.

A large supporting cast, aids Mr. Fairbanks materially in his mad career, particularly outstanding being Donald Crisp as a sympathetic Scotch pirate, Sam de Grasse as villain-in-chief, Anders Randolph as a pirate chief and Billie Dove as the fair lady in distress. A rousing musical score adds much to the production, which will be shown at the Capitol for three days starting tomorrow afternoon.

TO SWIM ENGLISH CHANNEL DISTANCE

Young Members of the Y.M.C.A. Have Entered an Interesting Contest.

STOCK MARKETS

(Reported by Johnston & Ward, corner King and Clarence Streets, members of the Montreal and Toronto Stock Exchanges).

The group of the young members at the "Y" proved Tuesday night that they were ready to qualify for the "Human Fish Club" on short notice. There is good interest in the speed swim, and also in fancy diving and plunge for distance. Following these events, two teams were organized to swim the English Channel distance in the pool. The boys will swim the seven twenty miles, which works out at 30,017 lengths of the Kingston pool. The plan is that the teams shall swim against each other, relaying as they will. The two teams swimming a definite period once or twice a week, and the team finishing first will win the event. Five of the boys on each team swim last night for ten minutes, at the end of which time the Red Team, captained by H. Budreo had done sixty-one lengths, while the Blue Team led by J. McLaughlin, had completed fifty-one lengths, ten feet. The interest in swimming is very keen at present and it is the intention that this phase of the physical department shall be emphasized this year. The installation of a spring board has stimulated interest in diving, and it is anticipated that interesting performances will be arranged when the boys have had a chance to practice awhile. The next lap of the Channel swim will be staged on Monday night. In the meantime, the present teams will be added to the intention being to have ten on each team. Those who swam last night were: Red Team—H. Budreo, R. Burke, W. Sherbino, J. Thompson, E. Shepard.

Blue team—J. McLaughlin, R. Darling, G. McLean, W. McLaughlin, E. Henderson.

The race for speed, five lengths of the pool, was won by Vernon Coe Harold Budreo came in second and James McLaughlin third. There were twenty possible points for the diving competition, the next dive and the named dive. Rosa Burke led with 13 points, G. McLean 16 1/2 points; W. Sherbino, J. Thompson and V. Coe tied for third place. The plunge for distance was won by Harold Budreo, who attained 32 feet, 6 inches.

CLOSE DETROIT PULPITS

To Leaders of American Federation of Labor.

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 5.—The closing of the pulpits of Detroit churches next Sunday to officers of the American Federation of Labor, withdrawal by the Young Men's Christian Association of an invitation extended to President William Green to make an address next Sunday, and a resolution offered to endorse the candidacy of Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York, for President in 1928 featured the Federation convention yesterday.

The ban against Labor officials stunned the delegates. Mr. Green, who was not officially notified of the action of the Y.M.C.A. directors, declined to discuss it, but issued a statement commenting on the action of the churches in barring Labor representatives, and charged the Detroit Board of Commerce and the Building Trades Association with responsibility for the decision of the churches.

The churches and the Y.M.C.A. decided to bar union representatives because of the controversy between union leaders in this city and manufacturers advocating the open shop and company unions.

Atlantic City, N.J., Oct. 6.—Decision was reserved by Vice-Chancellor Robert H. Ingraham on Jack Kearns' suit against Jack Dempsey, for an accounting. Dempsey's attorneys charged that Kearns had forged Dempsey's signature on a document; that the alleged forgery had been discovered by the New York State Boxing Commission, and that only Dempsey's good nature prevented criminal prosecution.

DUE TO POPULARITY OF THE ROBB BUDGET

Lord Byng's Opinion With Regard to the Canadian Elections.

Southampton, Eng., Oct. 5.—Lord and Lady Byng arrived at Southampton today on board the S. S. Empress of France, and were officially welcomed by the mayor and sheriff. One of the first enquiries put to Lord Byng by press representatives was with regard to his constitutional powers as governor-general.

"I think we had better leave that alone," said Lord Byng with laughter. "Everything turned out very satisfactorily. If the question is raised at all again, it will be at the Imperial Conference, but at the present moment there is nothing one can say about it."

Asked about the recent Dominion general election, Lord Byng expressed opinion that the result of the election was mainly due to the popularity of the Robb budget, with reduced taxation, and to three good harvests.

Lord Byng spoke with enthusiasm of the prospects which Canada opened to the British people, who were prepared to work hard there.
